The Wheel

Character Breakdown

STEVEN - The head engineer at Binning's Inclined Planes. His goal is to be a successful inventor.

RUDNICK – An evil, jolly man who owns Inclined Planes Inc., the largest inclined plane manufacturer in the world. His goal his global domination.

GERTIE - The tough but nurturing owner of Binning's Inclined Planes. She's been running the business alone since her husband, Paul, died a couple of years ago.

JOHNNY – An evil, teenaged go-getter who idolizes Rudnick.

DOTTIE – A brassy, bawdy secretary at Binning's Inclined Planes.

PEGGY – A quiet, shy secretary at Binning's who has a crush on Steven.

MARVIN – A geeky engineer at Binning's who has a crush on Peggy.

OG – A security guard for Inclined Planes Inc.

UGH – A security guard for Inclined Planes Inc.

FRANCIS – A big, dumb lug of a security guard for Inclined Planes Inc.

CHORUS – and various other small parts.

Two Acts, 12 scenes

Approximate running time: 105 minutes

The Wheel can easily be performed with as few as 8 actors if DOTTIE and GERTIE also take the roles of OG and UGH, and actors play chorus members and other small parts as needed.

Act I Scene 1 Approximately 40,000 B.C.

(As the curtain opens, a group of men in classic caveman garb do a ceremonial dance on the stage and chant. When the music changes, lights come up on an office. The office design is circa 1950, but with appropriate stone décor. STEVE, an inventor in his late 40s/early 50s, enters the office. He briefly examines some blueprints and a model of an inclined plane on his desk. Shortly after, GERTIE, an older woman and STEVE'S boss, enters.)

GERTIE

Hey Steve, could you go outside and tell the guys to come back in here? I've got to talk with them.

STEVE

Yeah, I'll be right out. I'm just having trouble with the final touches on these plans.

GERTIE

I'm sure they're fine.

STEVE

Fine never got anybody anywhere.

GERTIE

No, but it's kept them where they are. See you in a few minutes.

STEVE

Yeah . . .


(He continues to look at the plans, and turns away disappointed.)

Cue Track – 40,000 B.C.

WHY IS IT THAT I WAS BORN ON THIS MODERN AGE'S MORN WHEN AMENITIES HAVE MADE LIFE A BREEZE, BUT ALL THE GOOD IDEAS ARE GONE

WHEN NOT ALL THAT LONG AGO THERE WAS STILL SO MUCH TO KNOW AND INVENTORS THRIVED IN SOCIETY BUT I'M STUCK IN FORTY-THOUSAND B.C.

(STEVE exits his office and wanders into the main office of Binning's Inclined Planes, again circa 1950 with stone décor. PEGGY and DOTTIE, two of the office's secretaries, sit at their desks. PEGGY is mousy and in her early-to-mid 20s, and DOTTIE is in her late 30s to late 40s.



DOTTIE

Tell 'em hi from me.

STEVE

Always do.

(He continues on.)

DOTTIE

(To Peggy) Mmm. I will never get tired of looking at that man.

PEGGY

Did you two ever?

DOTTIE

Us? No. I don't think Steve's ever had more than a passing attraction to anything other than next year's model. And I'm not talking women. What about you and what's his name?

PEGGY

I'm sure he's not interested.

DOTTIE

Why don't you ask? What's the worst that could happen?

PEGGY

He could brush me off, completely shattering my confidence and triggering a long, downward spiral into self-loathing and depression, ultimately leaving me alone and unhappy until the day of my uneventful, pitiful death.

DOTTIE

Yeah, that would be pretty bad. (Pause) Or you could trip getting out of your chair and break your ankle or something.

PEGGY

Also true.

STEVE

THIS PICTURE JUST ISN'T RIGHT
MY FUTURE HAD BEEN SO BRIGHT
WITH THE THINGS I DID AS AN EAGER KID
THERE'S NO TELLING JUST HOW FAR I WOULD GO

BUT SO FAR AS I HAVE ASSESSED MY WORK'S BEEN SUB-PAR AT BEST FULL OF BAD AD HOC MEDIOCRITY 'CAUSE I'M STUCK IN FORTY-THOUSAND B.C.

(STEVE exits the main office and walks over to the group of dancing men.)

WHY CAN'T I JUST THINK OF ONE GREAT THING THAT HAS NOT BEEN DONE I'VE DONE NOTHING HERE, IT SEEMS CLEAR TO ME THAT I'M STUCK IN FORTY-THOUSAND B.C.

LOOK AT THE MAN WHOM THEY MOST ADMIRE INVENTING'S ONE-HIT WONDER, A LUCKY RAT WHO RUBBED TWO STICKS TOGETHER AND, BOOM, HE GOT FIRE I CAN'T HELP BUT THINK I COULD HAVE THOUGHT OF THAT

BUT I CAME TO THIS WORLD TOO LATE FOR MY WORK TO PROLIFERATE JUST SOME TWO-BIT JERK WORKING R AND D I'M STUCK IN FORTY-THOUSAND B.C

STEVE

(Spoken) Hey guys, Gertie wants us back in the office.

(MARVIN, a rather nerdy man in his 20s, walks over to STEVE as the rest of the group starts to head inside.)

MARVIN

Did you see that, Steve? It's going to be a great Fire Day celebration this year. You sure you don't want to be in the ceremony?

STEVE

No thanks, Marvin, I think I'll pass.

MARVIN

Your loss.

STEVE

Just don't want to upstage you, Marv.

(GERTIE stands in the main office.)

GERTIE

THIS WORLD'S SUCH A CORPORATE PLACE I MISS THE FAMILIAR FACE OF THE MOM OR POP IN THE CORNER SHOP WHEN A SMILE GREETED PATRONS HELLO

PEGGY AND DOTTIE

WHERE HAVE ALL THE GOOD GUYS BEEN WHY COULDN'T WE LIVE BACK THEN WHEN A MAN WAS A MAN, AND HE SHOWED CHIVALRY BUT NOW WE'RE STUCK IN FORTY-THOUSAND B.C.

(The MEN from outside enter, along with other EMPLOYEES.)

CHORUS

DRIFTING APART EVER SINCE PANGEA
OUR ONCE UNITED CULTURE IS FADING FAST
WHY WOULD IT HURT TO FLIRT WITH THE NOVEL IDEA
OF A WORLD WHERE NICE GUYS NEVER FINISH LAST

BUT THAT'S JUST A LAVISH DREAM WHEN AVARICE REIGNS SUPREME WHEN THE KIND HEARTS FALL, AND WE ALL AGREE THAT WE'RE STUCK IN FORTY-THOUSAND B.C.

EACH DAY'S FULL OF DREAD AND PAIN THIS WORLD'S GOING DOWN THE DRAIN 'CAUSE THE PLANET AIN'T WHAT IT USED TO BE WE'RE STUCK IN FORTY-THOUSAND B.C.

THERE WAS A TIME OF DECENCY BEFORE THIS TORRENT OF GREED BEGAN WHERE THE RICH IN SPIRIT FLOURISHED AND HE WHO STILL HAD HIS HEALTH WAS A WEALTHY MAN

BUT NOW, NOTHING HONEST PAYS
WE LONG FOR THE GOOD 'OL DAYS
WHEN THE LIVING HERE WAS EASY AND FREE

BUT NOW WE'RE STUCK IN FORTY-THOUSAND

GERTIE

Thanks for getting here so quickly, everybody--I know you're all preparing for the big Fire Day celebration. I called this meeting to respond to some of the rumors that have been floating around the office. Now there are some people out there claiming that this company is in trouble . . . that we're losing market share . . . that this company won't be around much longer. And do you know what I have to

GERTIE (CONT.)

say about those rumors? Yeah, I'm sorry, they're true.

(EMPLOYEES grumble.)

I know, I know. We work hard here, we do, but times have changed. You know, I'll put our inclined planes up against any other inclined planes in the world, but a small company like ours simply doesn't have the economies of scale and financial leverage that a company like Inclined Planes Incorporated has. And so--and now this is hush-hush, just between you, me, and the granite--I'll be dissolving the company shortly after the end of this quarter. I'm sorry, but money's pouring out of here faster than wine from a cask at a sorority-house engagement party, and it's putting a dent in my soon-to-be cushy retirement. That's the bottom line, literally and figuratively. Now I'm telling you this because I care about you, and I want to be honest with you, but that doesn't mean I want to see you slacking off in the next couple of weeks. You still work for me for a little while longer; let's go out on a roll. Thanks.

(GERTIE exits.)

MARVIN

(To Steve) What are we going to do?

STEVE

I don't know. I never thought this would happen. I mean, I knew things were bad, but I didn't think Gert would just close up shop like this. This has been her life for thirty years. I know it hasn't been the same for her since Paul died, but still, how do you just give something like that up?

MARVIN

Quickly. Given our finances, I'd do it quickly.

PEGGY

(To Dottie) I was finally starting to feel like I fit in here.

DOTTIE

And I finally got enough dirt on Phyllis to wipe that smug little smirk off her face for a long time. This was going to be a good year.

Well, what are you going to do?

DOTTIE

Oh, I don't know. I've got a little saved up. I'll probably take a few months off, go on a major bender, break a few guys' hearts.

PEGGY

Lucky guys.

DOTTIE

Very.

PEGGY

There are times I wish I could be more like you.

DOTTIE

Now why in the world would you want that?

PEGGY

I don't know. You just. . .you're so open to life. You're not scared of what's going to happen next, you're not worried about finding the right guy. I'm stuck here fawning over someone I barely know, and I can't even get up the nerve to talk with him.

DOTTIE

There's nothing wrong with that. Look, fact is, I want to find the right guy, but I know what I want, I know what's out there, and I know he's a rare breed. So, I spend my time having fun with all the wrong guys. No harm, no foul.

PEGGY

Why such high standards?

DOTTIE

It's not that.

PEGGY

I can help you, Dot. I know a lot of guys your age. . .

DOTTIE

Oookay! You can stop right there, Missy. First of all, I'm not quite sure what the whole "guys my age" thing means, and second of all, you can't help with this.

I understand, Dot. You're all tough on the outside, but I know the pain you must be going through. Maybe it's about time you let somebody in here (touching Dottie's chest).

DOTTIE

Do that again, hon, and I guarantee you I won't be the one going through pain.

PEGGY

Why won't you let me help you?

DOTTIE

Because it would be a tremendous waste of your time. Look, I have a thing. . .for a certain kind of guy. . .a certain kind of. . . large. . .virile. . .secluded. . .guy.

PEGGY

(Under her breath) You've got a Neanderthal fetish?

DOTTIE

My mom was always picking up these tabloids in the stores, and I remember seeing these pictures when I was growing up and thinking, "Yes. Yes, this would be good".

PEGGY

I guess that explains why you haven't found him yet.

DOTTIE

Like I said, he's going to be extremely hard to find.

PEGGY

Impossible.

DOTTIE

Extreeeemely hard.

PEGGY

(Sighs) Dottie, you know they're extinct, right?

DOTTIE

(Defensively) That's a matter of public debate and a vicious rumor. There's plenty of proof that they exist.

(She hurries to her desk, grabs a magazine, and opens to a page)

The tabloid pictures?

DOTTIE

It's not just tabloids anymore. This is semi-legitimate journalism here. (Quoting magazine) "Neanderthal sighting reported in Sahara Forest--Stonequarry University to study surrounding area for signs of hovel." And that was just last week. Here, take a look at the picture.

PEGGY

That's a drawing.

DOTTIE

It's a composite of witness accounts of actual sightings.

PEGGY

It looks like an eight-year-old drew it.

DOTTIE

HAVE YOU SEEN THEM AROUND? THERE ARE STILL A FEW OF 'EM THOUGH THEY'RE NEARLY EXTINCT, THEIR PHYSIQUE IS DISTINCT AND I'M HOPING TO SPOT ONE SOON

WAITING THERE TO BE FOUND
I'VE BEEN TOLD THAT I'D LOVE 'EM
ALWAYS THERE TO TAKE CHARGE
AND A BODY SO LARGE
HEAVEN'S SAKE, IT WOULD MAKE ME SWOON
I'M NOT SAYIN' IT'S GONNA HAPPEN
BUT IF I COULD, THEN I THINK THAT I WOULD LIKE TO GIVE IT A TRY
SO HANDSOME, THEY SAY, BIG AND STRAPPIN'
SUCH A MUSCULAR FIND, AND SO ONE-OF-A-KIND
THAT I'VE ALREADY MADE UP A MIND

DOTTIE

PEGGY

THAT I WANT A NEANDERTHAL

YOU WANT A NEANDERTHAL

I WANT A NEANDERTHAL

DOTTIE

'CAUSE IT'S REALLY ALRIGHT IF HE'S NOT VERY BRIGHT WHEN HE'S SPORTIN' THAT KIND OF BOD

DOTTIE

PEGGY

YEAH, I WANT A NEANDERTHAL

YOU WANT A NEANDERTHAL

I WANT A NEANDERTHAL

DOTTIE

I DON'T NEED CLEVER BANTER AS LONG AS I CAN'T PUT MY FINGERS AROUND HIS QUAD.

BUT NOW, DON'T GET ME WRONG NICER GUYS ARE APPEALING ALWAYS THERE TO PROVIDE YOU THEIR SENSITIVE SIDE AND CONSOLE YOU WHEN YOU'RE UPSET

SO IT'S BURLY AND STRONG VERSUS "HOW ARE YOU FEELING" AND IN THE VAST MULTITUDE OF NICE GUYS I'VE PURSUED NOT A ONE'S SATISFIED ME YET

FOR ONCE, I'D LIKE SOMEONE WHO'S HANDY A MAN COMF'TERBLE AND COOL WHO KNOWS HIS WAY 'ROUND A TOOL

AND A LUSCIOUS PIECE OF EYE CANDY SO I CAN'T NOW DENY THAT IT'S HIGH TIME THAT I SAY GOODBYE TO THE SENSITIVE GUY

DOTTIE PEGGY

'CAUSE I WANT A NEANDERTHAL

YOU WANT A NEANDERTHAL

I WANT A NEANDERTHAL

DOTTIE

WHEN MY WALL PAINT IS CHIPPING AND FAUCET IS DRIPPING HE'LL FIX THEM AND MAKE THEM NEW

DOTTIE

YEAH I WANT A NEANDERTHAL

DOTTIE PEGGY

YOU WANT A NEANDERTHAL

I WANT A NEANDERTHAL

DOTTIE

FOR THE BACON HE BRINGS, AND FOR ALL OF THINGS THAT A MAN WHO'S A MAN SHOULD DO

PEGGY

OH I DON'T KNOW
I THINK A SENSITIVE GUY
HAS ALL THE QUALITIES I DESIRE
I'VE ALWAYS WANTED TO MEET A MAN WHO'S PASSIONATE,
SWEET, AND SMART
WHO CAN LOOK INTO MY HEART
AND THERE'D BE NOTHING TO HIDE
'CAUSE HE'D FEEL SAFE TO CONFIDE IN ME
AND I THINK HE IS STANDING OVER THERE

PEGGY (CONT.)

COMPLETELY UNAWARE OF HOW I FEEL

DOTTIE

OH PEGGY, IT MAY BE TRUE THAT THOSE GUYS WORK FOR YOU BUT I NEED A MORE POWERFUL STEED

(The other SECRETARIES have gathered around to listen to the conversation.)

DOTTIE

YEAH I WANT A NEANDERTHAL

YOU WANT A NEANDERTHAL

PEGGY

SECRETARIES

SHE WANTS A NEANDERTHAL

DOTTIE

HAIR SO CURLY AND LONG, HE'S SO BURLY AND STRONG HE CAN PICK ME UP O'ER HIS HEAD

DOTTIE PEGGY

OH I WANT A NEANDERTHAL

YOU WANT A NEANDERTHAL

SECRETARIES

SHE WANTS A

WOMEN

NEANDERTHAL

DOTTIE AND PEGGY ACT NOW WHILE YOU CAN BEFORE EV'RY ONE OF 'EM'S DEAD

DOTTIE PEGGY

FOOTSTEPS SHAKING THE GROUND

MARVIN, PLEASE TURN AROUND

AND HE'S BUILT LIKE A STEER

HERE I AM OVER HERE

A SIZE-SEVENTEEN SHOE

WHAT DO I HAVE TO DO

SUCH A BAD LITTLE SEED

WE BOTH KNOW WHAT YOU NEED

DOTTIE AND PEGGY

NEANDERTHAL

SHOULD YOU EVER ENDEAVOR TO SEARCH AND ARE CLEVER ENOUGH TO SUCCEED, THEN INDEED, HEED THIS CALL THERE'S A WOMAN WHO'D GIVE UP WHATEVER TO FOREVER HAVE A NEANDERTHAL.

(STEVE stands with GERTIE on the other side of the room.)

GERTIE

Look, I'm really sorry.

STEVE

No, it's me who should be sorry. I feel like there's more I could have done. I just can't seem to break through lately.

GERTIE

You did your best, Steven, much more than I would expect from anyone else. Your "Implana" design is considered a classic.

STEVE

I never got it right. It can be better.

GERTIE

It'll have to be with someone else then. You have any idea what you might do?

STEVE

Not yet. You?

GERTIE

Oh, I'm done. I've got a nice little nest egg set aside, this money pit notwithstanding. You know, back when Paul bought this place I thought he was nuts. What a heap. But we did it. Thirty years here. You can't fight the times, and they're saying it's time to move on and spend the next thirty years on the beach. Hey, if you're looking for a job, you can always work for Inclined Planes Incorporated.

STEVE

(Incredulous look at first, then a slight chuckle, then into full laughter.) I thought you were serious for a second.

(Both continue laughing hard into Blackout.)

Act I Scene 2 Inclined Planes, Inc.

(A group of MEN sit around a stone table in a boardroom at Inclined Planes Inc. The president of the company, RUDNICK, sits at the head of the table, laughing.)

RUDNICK

Gentlemen, as you just heard from Mr. McGuillicudy, earnings are up again this quarter. I believe congratulations are in order.

MEN

Congratulations, Mr. Rudnick.

RUDNICK

Thank you. I've also been informed that our chief—and only—competitor, Binning's Inclined Planes, is not much longer for this corporate world. It was a good fight, but only because we won. With them out of the way, we'll be able to capture the remaining five percent of the inclined plane market, finally realizing the vision of our great founder

(The MEN in the room bow their heads as RUDNICK motions to a portrait on the wall.)

... Jim Mancratzenfield.

MEN

Hear, hear!

RUDNICK

With a monopoly on the market, we'll be able to price higher, produce cheaper, and expand into new frontiers. The goal, eventual domination of all global markets, is certainly one step closer to realization. Once again, congratulations are in order.

MEN

Congratulations, Mr. Rudnick.

(A buzz on the intercom from GIRL #1, RUDNICK'S secretary. RUDNICK answers.)

RUDNICK

Yes, girl?

GIRL #1

Sir, the winner of the "meet Robert J. Rudnick" contest is here.

RUDNICK

Is that today?

GIRL #1

Yes, sir.

RUDNICK

Well, by all means, send him in.

(GIRL #1 enters escorting JOHNNY, an evil teenaged go-getter)

GIRL #1

(To Rudnick) Here you go, sir, Johnny Brisco, winner of the "meet Robert J. Rudnick" contest.

RUDNICK

Thank you, girl, you can go.

(GIRL #1 exits)

So, Johnny, you're the lucky kid who gets to meet me.

JOHNNY

Yes sir.

RUDNICK

I understand your essay was far and away the most disturbing of all those received.

JOHNNY

I try my best, sir.

RUDNICK

Well I, too, Johnny, also try my best. And as winner of this contest, you get to spend the day with me . . . see how I work. You're a lucky boy, Johnny. Congratulations are in order.

MEN

Congratulations, Mr. Rudnick.

RUDNICK

You see, Johnny, that's the problem with yes men, not too bright, and the ones who are . . . too scared to speak up, but that's how we like 'em, right Johnny?

JOHNNY

Right, Mr. Rudnick.

RUDNICK

(To the men) This kid . . . I like this kid already. Don't I, Johnson?

JOHNSON

Yes, Mr. Rudnick.

RUDNICK

Beautiful. Well, men, that's about all from here. One last order of business . . . it, of course, being Tuesday, means that one of you gets fired. This week I'll choose . . . mmm . . . aw hell, Johnny, it's your day, why don't you pick one?

JOHNNY

Mmm . . . him.

RUDNICK

Good choice. You, what's your name?

ROBERT RUDNICK JR.

Uh. . .Robert J. Rudnick Jr.. . .dad.

RUDNICK

I thought you looked familiar. My eyes, my nose, my devilish good looks. But you know one thing we don't have in common son?

ROBERT RUDNICK JR.

What?

RUDNICK

Employment at this company. You're fired.

(ROBERT RUDNICK JR. starts to leave)

Wait, son, come back! You think I'd actually fire you?

(ROBERT RUDNICK JR. smiles in relief)

RUDNICK (CONT.)

Of course I would. I would have thought you'd know your own father a little better. Pack up your things, you're out of here.

(ROBERT RUDNICK JR. exits.)

Johnny, lesson number one, you can't like anybody.

(JOHNNY takes out a pen and small notepad and starts writing)

Even you, Johnny. I say that I like you, but what that really means is that I hate you a little bit less than everybody else. And I hate everybody, Johnny.

JOHNNY

Genius, sir.

RUDNICK

Cue Track – I Hate Everybody WHEN I AM INTRODUCED TO A MAN I'VE NEVER MET
THERE'S NOT A PRAYER IN THE AIR THAT I'LL LIKE HIM,
'CAUSE I'VE YET
TO MEET A MAN WHO DOES NOT BRING ABOUT MY PURE DISDAIN
AND ALL INTENT TO MAKE THIS GENT SURPASS MY MALCONTENT
WILL BE IN VAIN
DON'T EVEN TRY, I KNOW THE OUTCOME'S PREORDAINED
'CAUSE SLAP ME, AND CALL ME NUTTY,
BUT I HATE EVERYBODY IN THE WORLD

NO I CAN'T STAND ANY MAN ON THE PLANET WHO'S NOT ME AND THAT'S THE THING THAT HAS MADE ME KING OF INDUSTRY BECAUSE ALTHOUGH A FOE MAY BE JUST AS SMART AS I, HE FOLDS 'CAUSE HE KNOWS THERE'S NO STUNT BELOW MY MORALS, NOTHING I WON'T TRY AND COWARDS COWER, STRONG MEN BEG AND PLEAD, AND EVEN HARD ASSES TURN TO PUTTY 'CAUSE I HATE EVERYBODY IN THE WORLD

YES ALL YOU LOSERS MAKE ME ILL AND THERE ARE TIMES WHEN I'M COMPELLED TO LEAVE YOU JERKS FOR GOOD UNTIL, I STOP AND THINK AND THEN I'M DRAWN BACK BY THE LURE OF MAKING SURE THAT YOUR JOBS STINK

THE REASON I CAN DEBATE AND NEGOTIATE WITH EASE IS RIVALS DROP TO MY MISANTHROPIC TENDENCIES FOR JUST THE THREAT THAT I'M OUT TO GET THEM IS ENOUGH AND I'VE ENJOYED THE MESSY FALL OF ALL WHO'VE HAD THE GALL TO CALL MY BLUFF THE BUSINESS WORLD IS CUTTHROAT, EV'RY DAY'S A WAR AND I MAKE IT EXTRA BLOODY, 'CAUSE I HATE EVERYBODY IN THE WORLD

RUDNICK (CONT.)

(Spoken) Take this bridge, Johnson!

JOHNSON

(Attempting to make something up on the spot)
UM, HE IS MY BOSS, AND I LIKE WORKING FOR HIM, CAUSE HE IS
GOOD. YEAH.

RUDNICK

(Sarcastically) Yeah. That was great Johnson. Good job. Got me right here. (disgusted sigh)

I CAN'T UNDERSTAND HOW YOU CAN STAND YOURSELVES YOU'RE FIRED MCGUILLICUDY

(Yelled) Why?

MEN

'CAUSE HE HATES EVERYBODY IN THE WORLD

RUDNICK

IT'S TRUE, NO IFS, NO ANDS, OR BUTS, IF YOU EXIST, I HATE YOUR GUTS IT MAKES NO DIFFERENCE WHAT YOU SAY, I'M GONNA LOATHE YOU ANYWAY YOUR ARM'S A TWIG, YOUR HEAD'S TOO BIG YOUR KID'S A DWEEB, YOUR WIFE'S A PIG I HATE THAT GUY, I HATE YOUR TIE I WISH YOU'D JUST FALL DOWN AND DIE

IN LIFE I'VE FOUND MY PROPER PLACE IS HATING ALL THE HUMAN RACE YES, I HATE YOU, AND I HATE YOU

EMPLOYEE

DO YOU HATE ME?

RUDNICK

Scene 3

Binning's Inclined Planes

CHORUS

FIRE DAY IS ALMOST HERE, TIME FOR JOY AND TIME FOR CHEER. SUCH A WOND'ROUS TIME OF YEAR, IT'S FIRE DAY.

(PEGGY is sitting at her desk as MARVIN walks by)

MARVIN

Hi Peggy, how's it going?

PEGGY

(Flustered at seeing MARVIN) Oh, fine. Busy.

MARVIN

Yeah. Are you coming to the ceremony tomorrow?

PEGGY

Of course.

MARIN

Because the guys and me are doing something for it.

Yeah, I know, you've been practicing very hard.

MARVIN

Yeah, and we just wanted to make sure you were going to be there.

PEGGY

I wouldn't miss it.

MARVIN

Great. Well, I'll talk to you later.

(STEVE walks by on his way to his office.)

Steve are . . .

STEVE

Still not going, Marvin.

MARVIN

Oh, but Steve . . .

(STEVE shuts the door to his office, leaving MARVIN outside. MARVIN sees another employee.)

Gladys, are you going to be at the ceremony?

CHORUS

FIRE DAY IS HERE AT LAST, HURRY 'CAUSE IT'S GOING FAST. LAUGH AND SING, AND SOON, IT'S PASSED, IT'S FIRE DAY

DOTTIE

(To loin-cloth-wearing employee) Great job out there, Peter. You too, Ricky, looking good.

MARVIN

(Approaching Dottie) Did you like the dance?

DOTTIE

You kidding? Men in loin cloths, what could be better? How did you like it?

MARVIN

What do you mean?

DOTTIE

How did you like the show?

MARVIN

I was in it.

DOTTIE

Oh, right, right. Yeah, oh, you were great out there, too, Melvin.

MARVIN

Marvin.

DOTTIE

Right. . . Marvin. Great job out there.

MARVIN

(A little dejected) Thanks. Hey, do you know if Peggy saw the show?

DOTTIE

Yeah, she liked it.

MARVIN

Really, I thought she would. She didn't mention me, by any chance, did she?

(GERTIE approaches DOTTIE and MARVIN)

GERTIE

Hey, Dottie, have you seen Steve around here?

DOTTIE

I think he's in his office, he's been locked in there all day. Inventor envy.

GERTIE

Oh, right, the Fire Day thing. Well, tell him if he doesn't come out soon, I'm going to yank him out. I don't want anybody sulking on the last Fire Day this office is going to see.

DOTTIE

I'll go talk to him.

(She leaves)

GERTIE

(To Marvin) So, are you one of Dottie's friends?

MARVIN

I work here, ma'am.

GERTIE

Oh, right. Chuck, right?

MARVIN

Yeah.

CHORUS

ALL HAIL FIRE DAY TIME FOR THE YOUNG AND OLD TO PLAY. SADNESS AND GLOOM HAVE GONE AWAY, IT'S FIRE DAY. IT'S FIRE DAY.

DOTTIE

(Knocking on Steve's door) Steve? Hon, there's food out here if you're hungry.

STEVE

Thanks Dot, but I'm just not in the mood.

DOTTIE

(Not believing him) Yeah, sure. Gertie wants you out here. She says to stop sulking.

STEVE

She should try it sometime. It can be quite nice.

(PEGGY comes up to DOTTIE.)

PEGGY

Is he in there?

DOTTIE

Yeah, but he's sulking.

PEGGY

Oh, right. Inventor envy. Gotcha.

STEVE

Fire day. What has fire ever gotten us? So we can cook food, big deal. I could live on nuts and berries. Oh, but Steve,

STEVE (CONT.)

fire's so great, greatest invention of all time. Yeah, smart guy. I wonder what will happen if I rub two sticks together? Oh, I'll become world famous and be the envy of my peers. Dammit.

WHEN I'M GONE, WHEN I'M THROUGH,
WILL IT MAKE ANY DIFFERENCE I'M DOING
THE THINGS THAT I DO?
WILL IT ALL BE A WASTE?
NEVER KNOWN, NEVER MISSED.
NOT A SINGULAR LASTING IMPRESSION
TO SHOW I EXIST.
ANY TRACE SOON ERASED.
AND I CAN'T SHAKE THE FEELING THAT'S DRIVING ME—
MY LIMITED TIME'S RUNNING OUT.

WE ARE HERE, THEN WE'RE NOT

ALL THE NIGHTS, ALL THE YEARS WORKING TIRELESSLY, THEN IN ONE BRILLIANT FLASH, IT APPEARS THAT MY LIFE MAY NOT BE SUCH A WASTE AFTER ALL I'VE BEEN THROUGH, I CAN FINALLY TASTE IT MAY TAKE ALL I'VE GOT, BUT I'LL NOT BE JUST GONE WHEN I GO. SOON THEY'LL KNOW. SOON THEY'LL KNOW.

CHORUS

FIRE DAY IS, SADLY, DONE, BUT NO CRYING ANYONE, PLANS FOR NEXT YEAR HAVE BEGUN, **CHORUS**

IT'S FIRE DAY. IT'S FIRE DAY. IT'S FIRE DAY. IT'S FIRE DAY.

IT'S FIRE DAY.

STEVE

It's done.

PEGGY

Geez, Steve, did you sleep in there?

STEVE

I'm not sure, the whole night was kind of a blur. You've got to see this.

GERTIE

What is it? Wow, you stink.

STEVE

It's . . . let me show you.

GERTIE

OK.

STEVE

I'll be right out. You get everybody together.

DOTTIE

(To Peggy) Just so you know, this whole thing is usually pretty sad.

PEGGY

How so?

DOTTIE

Well you see, the thing about Steve is . . . well, he's always trying to do something revolutionary. And each year about this time he gets all depressed about being an unknown inventor, and each year he comes up with an idea and convinces himself that it's the next great thing. Usually, it's just some doodad added onto one of our planes.

GERTIE

Last year he made the base thicker and called it a new safety feature.

DOTTIE

Don't get me wrong, some of his ideas are pretty good,

GERTIE

They've kept this company going.

DOTTIE

But, well . . .

GERTIE

It's not like the guy's inventing fire or anything.

(STEVE enters carrying something under a cloth)

STEVE

Is everybody here?

GERTIE

They're all yours.

STEVE

Cue Track – The Wheel

THANK YOU FOR COMING
I THINK YOU'LL LIKE WHAT YOU'RE ABOUT TO SEE
WHAT I'M ABOUT TO SHOW YOU
COULD AFFECT SOCIETY
AN INVENTION THAT COULD CHANGE THE WORLD
THAT COULD SAVE THIS COMPANY

CHORUS

ALL YOUR SPEECHES START OUT THIS WAY

STEVE

BUT THE DIFFERENCE IS THAT THIS ONE'S DIFFERENT

(STEVE holds up an object and removes the cloth to reveal the blueprints for a wheel.)

CHORUS

WHAT IS IT

STEVE

A SIMPLE LITTLE MACHINE, MUCH LIKE THE INCLINED PLANE

CHORUS

WHAT'S ITS NAME

STEVE

I CALL IT

THE WORKER'S HELPER FOR ENGAGING EASY LOCOMOTION

CHORUS THE WORKER'S HELPER FOR ENGAGING EASY LOCOMOTION

STEVE

IN SHORT, THE W. H. E. E. L. WHEEL

(STEVE removes a cloth from an object to reveal a simple cart resembling a wheelbarrow.)

STEVE

(Spoken) See those boulders over there? Eight of them. A hundred pounds each. Load 'em on.

(A couple of EMPLOYEES lift the boulders onto the cart.)

Now watch.

(STEVE starts pushing the cart.)

CHORUS

MRS. BINNING, THE WHEEL IS SPINNING AND IT'S MOVING THE LOAD ALONG STILL AVAILING, IT ISN'T FAILING WEIGHTED DOWN, BUT IT'S GOING STRONG

EVER CHURNING, THE WHEEL IS TURNING HALFWAY THERE, BUT A WAYS TO GO FINISH IT, COME ON WHEEL, DON'T QUIT NOW FIND THE POWER TO MAKE IT SO

HALLELUIA, IT'S COMIN' TO 'YA COME ON WHEEL, JUST A LITTLE MORE AND IT'S CLEAR NOW, THE WHEEL IS HERE NOW IT'S THE MIRACLE WE'VE BEEN WAITING FOR

GERTIE

WELL, I CAN HARDLY BELIEVE MY EYES A GUY LIKE YOU WITH A LOAD THAT SIZE THIS LITTLE WHEEL'S AN AMAZING THING JUST LOOK AT IT

CHORUS

LOOK AT IT

GERTIE CHORUS
IT'S REVOLVIN' IT'S REVOLVING, THE WHEEL'S REVOLVING

WHOA, EVER CHURNING

GERTIE CHORUS

THANK YOU STEVEN THANK YOU STEVEN, FOR YOUR CONCEIVIN'

THIS SIMPLE THING HAS A CHANCE TO BE THE GREATEST FIND IN PREHISTORY AND WE'RE THE ONES THAT WILL MAKE THIS VISION REAL SO REAL, SURREAL

Act I Scene 4 Inclined Planes Incorporated

(RUDNICK sits in a chair while a SCULPTOR carves his face into stone. The carved head looks like an Easter Island head. JOHNNY looks on.)

RUDNICK

No, no, no. That doesn't look like me at all. You know, this is about the four-hundredth time that I've asked you for this (pointing to his own face), and you've given me this. (pointing to sculpture). Does this (face) look like this? (sculpture) Has this ever looked like this? Johnny.

JOHNNY

(To sculptor) You're fired.

(RUDNICK makes motion indicating "more")

You no-talent hack.

RUDNICK

Well done, Johnny. Personally, I'd have gone with "slack-jawed trash monger", but yours cut nicely to the chase. Johnson!

(JOHNSON enters.)

JOHNSON

Yes, sir?

RUDNICK

Get this thing out of here.

JOHNSON

We're running out of room in the warehouse, sir.

RUDNICK

Well just dump the lot of 'em on one of those islands we acquired in the Chesapeake takeover. I need them out of here now.

JOHNSON

Yes, sir.

RUDNICK

Oh, and Johnson.

JOHNSON

Fired, sir?

RUDNICK

No, that's not what I was going to say. But good idea. Unfortunately, it's the last one you'll have for this company. Johnny?

JOHNNY

It's your turn, sir.

RUDNICK

Oh, right. Johnson, you're fired.

(JOHNSON leaves)

Now, where were we?

JOHNNY

Lesson fifty-three, sir.

RUDNICK

Right. Lesson fifty-three is . . . a bird in the hand is worth somewhere between one-and-a-half to three pigs in the Outer Peondack Finger Islands, depending on the going exchange rate at the time.

JOHNNY

Um, I thought that was lesson twenty-four, sir. And at the time, you told me that the going exchange rate was somewhere between two and five fatted calves, which frankly sounds like a much better deal.

RUDNICK

Hyperinflation. . .it's tearing the Peondackian economy apart as we speak! (Beat) Aw, I'm just messin' with you, Johnny. I've been making this whole thing up as I went along. Goes to show that you can't trust anybody. There's a lesson in that, I guarantee you.

JOHNNY

Sir, if you don't mind my asking, who's that on the wall?

RUDNICK

That, Johnny, is one of the few geniuses of our time--Jim Mancratzenfield, now that's Mr. Mancratzenfield to you. He founded this company through his own evil blood, evil sweat, and evil tears. It was his dream to one day corner the market on inclined planes. It was a small dream, perhaps, but certainly an admirable one. And we're almost there, Johnny. He would be proud.

JOHNNY

Did you trust him, sir?

RUDNICK

Not as far as I could throw him, Johnny, and Jim was a big man.

(GIRL #2 enters)

GIRL #2

Sir, one of the men just got this over the wire.

RUDNICK

Thanks, girl.

(GIRL #2 exits. RUDNICK opens the letter.)

RUDNICK (CONT.)

Oh, this can't be good.

JOHNNY

What's the problem, sir?

RUDNICK

Our competition just issued a press release announcing, quote, "The future of simple machines". They're exiting the inclined plane business. (Quoting) "This revolutionary new invention will be unveiled at a press conference at the Old Rock Hotel this afternoon at 2 PM. Tell me, Johnny, are you averse to stealing?

JOHNNY

Not any more averse than I am to, say, killing puppies.

RUDNICK

You go through a lot of puppies Johnny?

JOHNNY

As many as possible, sir.

RUDNICK

Good to hear, Johnny, good to hear.

Act I

Scene 5

Binning's Inclined Planes

GERTIE

(To Steve) Everything set?

STEVE

Yeah, we're all loaded up. We're leaving in ten minutes.

GERTIE

Alright. (Pause) Hey, this is going to be big, isn't it?

(STEVE nods)

Let's go get 'em.

(GERTIE and STEVE exit. PEGGY and DOTTIE sit at their desks as MARVIN works at another desk.)

DOTTIE

There he is. Say something.

PEGGY

No, he's busy.

DOTTIE

He was asking about you, you know. I think he likes you.

PEGGY

(Sarcastically) Right.

DOTTIE

I'm not kidding. You know, we're out of here in a couple of weeks. If you want to get to know him, you're running out of time. I'm going outside. I'll meet you out there.

PEGGY

OK, I'll be out in a second. (To herself). OK, Pegs, just talk to him. Say hi. He'll say hi. Then you'll talk for a little while, and you can tell him how you feel. Then you'll fall and break your ankle or something. Simple.

(Music starts. PEGGY slowly walks toward MARVIN, and then chickens out and runs back to her desk. She tries again, this time getting closer. Once again, she chickens out. As she reaches her desk the second time, the lights change.)

HEY THERE, MAN, I WAS WONDERIN'
HAVE YOU BEEN THINKIN' OF ME
I KNOW I'VE BEEN THINKIN' OF YOU
EV'RY SECOND MY MIND CAN SEE FIT TO PRY FREE
WELL I'M HERE FOR THE TAKING
BUT TAKING ME'S ALL UP TO YOU
BUT I'M MAKIN' IT EASY, NO WORRIES, NO GAMES, NO REJECTION
ALL YOU'VE GOT TO DO IS JUST

CLUB ME NOW,
YEAH JUST CLUB ME NOW,
UH JUST CLUB ME NOW, 'CAUSE I DON'T KNOW HOW
I CAN GO ON WITHOUT YOUR LOVE

(PEGGY walks back to her desk, and plops her head down on it as the lights shift back to normal.)

MARVIN

Hey, are you feeling OK?

PEGGY

Oh! Yeah, I'm fine. I'm just . . . I'm just excited about this whole wheel thing, you know?

MARVIN

Yeah.

PEGGY

Steve is so talented. You know him pretty well, right?

MARVIN

Well, we work together. He's great, you know?

PEGGY

He really is great, isn't he?

MARVIN

(A little dejected) Yeah, he's great. Oh, hey, everybody's leaving, you'd better get out there. I wouldn't miss this.

(GERTIE enters)

GERTIE

OK, let's go. The slab is heading out, we don't want to be late.

(The last couple of EMPLOYEES start flowing out of the office. GERTIE stops MARVIN.)

Hey, Chuck, right? Look, we need you to keep an eye on things here, OK? Thanks.

MARVIN

But . . . yeah, OK.

GERTIE

OK, let's go, let's go, let's go.

(Everybody exits except for MARVIN, and the lights go out in the office. After a beat, MARVIN flips on a desk lamp.)

MARVIN

Cue Track – Marvin

SO HERE I AM
AND THERE THEY WENT
ALONE AGAIN, AND LEFT BEHIND
YOU'D THINK I'D GET BENT OUT OF SHAPE
BUT YOU'D BE WRONG,
'CAUSE THAT'S NOT ME
I DO THE THINGS THAT NO ONE WANTS,
AND TAKE THEM ON MOST EAGERLY
WHEN THERE'S A JOB THAT MUST BE DONE
UNDER THE GUN, NO FUN, WHERE DO THEY RUN?
THEY COME TO INDISPENSABLE, COMPREHENSIBLE,
SENSIBLE MARVIN
THE MAN WHO WON'T LET YOU DOWN

I MAY NOT BE A WELL-LIKED GUY BUT SOON THEY'LL SEE, AND IF I TRY, I KNOW THAT I CAN WIN THEIR HEARTS. I DON'T HAVE GRACE, I DON'T HAVE WIT, A HANDSOME FACE, GOOD MANNERS, STYLE, OR MONEY COME TO THINK OF IT

BUT I'VE GOT MOXY LEFT TO SPARE AND DECENT HAIR, SO THERE, NOT THAT I CARE I'M ONLY ALWAYS VIABLE, OLD RELIABLE, PLIABLE MARVIN, THE MAN WHO WON'T LET YOU DOWN.

WHEN THEY NEED SOMEONE WHO CAN TAKE ON THEIR PROBLEMS.
I'M THEIR JACK-OF-ALL TRADES.
I DO IT ALL
FROM THE LIGHT CLEANING TO THE EIGHT-HUNDRED-TEN PAGE
REPORT ON THE TRENDS IN OUR TOP-SELLING GRADES.

(Spoken) That took a long time. You know what the conclusion was? "A larger study is needed to fully express and predict the conditions under which a targeted consumer will purchase a given inclined plane. Recommendation is for a doubling of the sample size and complete reworking of the original study design." I'm on page three. (Pause) It would be nice to be noticed. You know what would be nice? A thank you. A "thanks, Marvin, you really bailed us out there", or a "couldn't have done it without you, Marvin ol'

MARVIN (CONT.)

pal". (Pause) Hey guys, I just cleaned out the stock room.

(A MAN enters.)

MAN

Hey, thanks, big guy!

MARVIN

Yeah, and I filed all of those commission reports for you.

(MAN #2 enters.)

MAN #2

Thanks, buddy! You're the best!

(A CHORUS starts entering.)

MARVIN

I edited that copy, finished those blueprints, fed Freddy McTurtle, and guess who brought muffins!

(CHORUS heads to congratulate MARVIN, cheering him on.)

I'VE GOT IT ALL, OR SOON I WILL
I'LL JUST STAND TALL, AND CLIMB THAT HILL, YOU SEE,
UNTIL I WIN THEIR HEARTS
IT MAY BE ROUGH, BUT EVEN SO,
I MUST HANG TOUGH, 'CAUSE SURE ENOUGH
AS I HAVE BREATH, I ALSO KNOW

CHORUS

YOU'RE GONNA BE OUR FRIEND SOMEDAY

MARVIN

WILL I BE GREY? I MAY. BUT, HEY, THAT'S OK

CHORUS

BECAUSE HE'S UNOFFENDABLE, OPEN-ENDABLE, BENDABLE MELVIN YOU CAN'T KEEP A GOOD MAN DOWN

MARVIN

BUT AM I GOOD?

CHORUS

EXCELLENT QUESTION, MELVIN

MARVIN

THANK YOU, I THOUGHT SO

(Spoken) (To Chorus) Hey guys, it's Marvin.

CHORUS

BUT ARE YOU GOOD?

MARVIN

WHAT GOOD CAN IT DO IF NO ONE NOTICES WHAT YOU DO? HOW GOOD CAN IT BE IF NO ONE NOTICES THAT IT'S YOU WHO'S ALWAYS THE ONE WHO NEEDS TO NOTICE THE PEOPLE WHO NEED TO BE NOTICED? DO THEY KNOW THAT I'D LIKE TO BE NOTICED, TOO?

(MARVIN sees the schematics for the wheel sitting on a desk.)

(Spoken) "Schematics for the Worker's Helper for Engaging Easy Locomotion". That's odd. Why doesn't Steve have these with him?

CHORUS MEMBER #1

Hey, Mel, maybe he forgot 'em!

MARVIN

You think?

CHORUS MEMBER #2

They could probably use those plans at the press conference!

MARVIN

You're probably right!

CHORUS MEMBER #3

Hey, everybody! Three cheers for the guy who's gonna come through for us again!

CHORUS

HIP, HIP, HOORAY! HIP, HIP, HOORAY! HIP, HIP, HOORAY! WELL MELVIN'S SMART

MARVIN

(Spoken) That's Marvin!

CHORUS

AND ON HIS GAME TWO-THOUSAND POUNDS OF HEART COMPRESSED CHORUS (CONT.)

INTO A LESS IMPRESSIVE FRAME WELL MELVIN'S NICE

MARVIN

(Spoken) Still Marvin!

CHORUS

AND ALWAYS GOOD HE TAKES INSANELY MORE ABUSE THAN ANY NORMAL HUMAN SHOULD

MARVIN I'M THEIR WHITE-COLLAR CAVALIER

CHORUS

SO HAVE NO FEAR, HE'S HERE, OUR MANHANDLED MAN OF THE YEAR. WE'RE TALKIN' UNFANTASTICAL, NONBOMBASTICAL, SPASTICAL

(MARVIN cuts off the CHORUS and starts to mouth the word "Marvin".)

CHORUS

MAR...

(MARVIN turns to the audience and smiles.)

...VELOUS MELVIN
YOU CAN'T KEEP A GOOD MAN DOWN.
NO, YOU CAN'T KEEP A GOOD MAN DOWN.

CHORUS AND MARVIN NO, YOU CAN'T KEEP A GOOD MAN DOWN.

Act I Scene 6 Press Conference

(STEVE and GERTIE make final preparations as MEMBERS OF THE PRESS get settled. A cloth-covered case sits on the platform. GERTIE stands up to the podium.)

GERTIE

Hello. As you know, we don't do this very often. We never really believed in press conferences, "always let your product do the talking", my husband said. I suppose without these things you guys'd be pretty much out of a job.

(Chuckles a little and waits for a response. There isn't one.)

GERTIE (CONT.)

Right. Well, then, the reason we called this conference is that we think we've got something special here, and we wanted to let everybody know. This thing is gonna knock your socks off. It's gonna be hotter than two young newlyweds making sweet, sweet love under a bearskin blanket in the middle of August. And here to introduce this new invention is our head engineer and inventor extraordinaire, Steven Barrows.

STEVE

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN, MEMBERS OF THE PRESS I WELCOME YOU AND I URGE YOU TO TAKE A MOMENT FROM YOUR DAY TO REMEMBER THIS WORLD JUST THE WAY IT IS NOW 'CAUSE IN A MOMENT OR TWO SHORTLY AFTER ALL THAT I'M ABOUT TO SAY A PIECE OF STONE'S GONNA CHANGE THE WORLD A LITTLE PIECE OF GRANITE NOTHING MORE A SIMPLE LITTLE THING THAT I CALL THE WHEEL PREPARE YOURSELVES FOR WHAT LIES IN STORE

STEVE EMPLOYEES
IT'S AMAZING IT'S AMAZING, THE WHEEL'S AMAZING
WHOA, IT'S AMAZING AND IT'S BLAZING A NEW FRONTIER
HALLELUIAH HALLELUIAH, IT'S COMIN' TO 'YA
WHOA, HALLELUIAH TELL THE PUBLIC, THE WHEEL IS HERE

IT'LL CHANGE US
WHOA, IT'LL CHANGE US
AN INVENTION
THAT'S CHANGING CONVENTION

TO CHANGE US
HOW WE THINK, HOW WE ACT, AND FEEL
AN INVENTION TO CHANGE CONVENTION
DID WE MENTION IT'S CALLED THE WHEEL

STEVE

WELL HOLD ON TO YOUR HATS AND HAVE A SEAT IF YOU MUST BUT STAY CALM, NOW, FOR EVERYTHING YOU'RE WORTH 'CAUSE YOU CAN'T BE PREPARED FOR WHAT IS UNDER THIS CLOTH IT'S A WONDROUS THING, AND JUST LIKE THE EARTH

STEVE EMPLOYEES

IT'S REVOLVIN', THE WHEEL'S REVOLVIN'
WHOA, IT'S REVOLVIN'
WE'RE EVOLVIN'
YEAH, WE'RE EVOLVIN'
BRAIN'S THE SAME, BUT THE CONSCIOUS GROWS

PRESS MEMBER PRESS

SHOW IT TO US
COME ON, SHOW IT TO US
LET US SEE IT
COME ON, LET US SEE IT
COULD IT BE THAT IT'S WHAT HE CLAIMS

STEVE

AND THUS WITH NO MORE UNDUE DELAY I GIVE THIS GIFT UNTO YOU THIS DAY

STEVE (CONT.) IT IS MY HONOR AND PRIVILEGE TO REVEAL, REVEAL THE WHEEL

(STEVE removes the cloth, but the case is empty. Gasps are heard from the crowd. STEVE is in shock.)

GERTIE

Where is it?

PRESS MEMBER

Hey, what's the deal?

(Similar sentiments are echoed in the crowd.)

GERTIE

Ladies and gentlemen, I'm sorry, but it seems as though something has happened to our new invention, I'm sure it will be sorted out shortly.

(The PRESS start to leave.)

No, please stick around. I'm sure this will be cleared up soon. (To employees) It's Rudnick.

STEVE

It's gone.

GERTIE

We'll get it back.

STEVE

How? We didn't patent it. All Rudnick has to do is call his own press conference and show the prototype.

(MARVIN comes running in carrying a set of blueprints in his hands.)

MARVIN

I'm sorry I left the building, but I thought you might need these.

GERTIE

What are they?

MARVIN

Schematics for the wheel.

There is no wheel.

PEGGY

Is this the only set?

STEVE

Yes.

PEGGY

Well, he can't build another one without these.

STEVE

Are you kidding? He's got the best people in the world working for him. He'll be able to reverse engineer that thing in a week. Without the prototype, we're sunk. I thought I had it.

GERTIE

(To Peggy) We'll build another one.

PEGGY

Is there time?

STEVE

(To himself)

I SHOULD HAVE SEEN IT COMING
WHY WAS I SO NAÏVE
THE MOMENT LIFE CAN GET YOU DOWN
IS THE MOMENT YOU BELIEVE
THAT THINGS ARE GOOD
THAT'S THE MOMENT THINGS GET RIPPED AWAY
AND THEY TELL ME JUST TO LET IT GO AND FIGHT ANOTHER DAY

(Now to everyone)

THAT DAY IS NOW
THERE COMES A TIME WHEN IT'S NO LONGER ACCEPTABLE
TO SHRUG THINGS OFF WITH BUT A FROWN
THERE COMES A TIME WHEN IT'S TIME
TO THROW THE GAUNTLET DOWN

AND SAY, NO MORE
MY TIME IS NOW
THAT WHEEL IS MINE
I WILL WIN IT BACK SOMEHOW

AND I'M SICK AND TIRED

PEGGY

IF HE'S GOING, WELL, THEN I AM GOING, TOO

STEVE, PEGGY, AND MARVIN	CHORUS

	BEAR UPON YOUR VAIN MONSTROCITIES

STEVE

All set. Wish us luck.

GERTIE

Good luck. Hey Steve, I just want to make sure you're not doing this on account of me. I told you, I'm about ready to call it quits anyway.

STEVE

I'd be lying if I said I weren't doing it for myself.

GERTIE

Good, that's excellent. (Pause) But you are doing it a little bit for me, aren't you?

STEVE

Of course.

GERTIE

(Excitedly) Alright! You go find Rudnick and give him one for me.

STEVE

Will do.

(DOTTIE is talking to PEGGY in another part of the office.)

DOTTIE

I want to go on record as saying that this is absolutely nuts.

PEGGY

What happened to "If you want to get to know him, you're running out of time?"

DOTTIE

I meant ask him out for a drink, not commit felonies.

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This is probably worth at least three or four regular dates, right?

DOTTIE

(Sighs) Do you have everything?

PEGGY

I hope so.

DOTTIE

(Pulling some sandwiches out of Peggy's bag) What is this?

PEGGY

Sandwiches. What? I thought we might get hungry. (Pause) My mother always taught me that the best way to a man is through his stomach.

DOTTIE

That would be the second best way, dear, unless your father was a eunuch.

PEGGY

I don't get it.

DOTTIE

Neither did your father, apparently, but at least he didn't go hungry.

STEVE

Are we ready?

MARVIN

I think so.

PEGGY

I am.

STEVE

Here we go, then.

(STEVE, PEGGY, and MARVIN start out.)

GERTIE

Good luck, guys! We'll be waiting for you!

DOTTIE

Come back in one piece!

(STEVE, PEGGY, and MARVIN exit.)

GERTIE

Well, that was fun. They're going to fail miserably right?

DOTTIE

Was Peggy's father an incredibly frustrated man?

GERTIE

(To everybody)

Cue Track – We're Going Under PACK EVERYTHING UP, LET'S GO
WE GOTTA CLEAR THIS PLACE OUT
AND THERE'S A LOT OF WORK AHEAD
YOU'RE MOVIN' AROUND TOO SLOW
LET'S GET A MOVE ON PEOPLE
DIDN'T YOU HEAR WHAT I JUST SAID

NOW DON'T GIVE ME THOSE ASTONISHED FACES YOU ALL KNEW THAT THIS WAS DUE TO HAPPEN SOON THERE'S NOTHING I CAN DO SO MOVE THOSE BOXES OFF THE STOCKROOM SHELVES TAKE THOSE POSTERS OFF THE DOOR STOP COMPILING NEXT WEEK'S AD REPORTS WE WON'T NEED THEM ANYMORE

IT'S BEEN FUN, BUT NOW OUR RUN HAS ENDED I'D INTEND TO DEAL WITH THAT SOMEHOW

AND STOP READING MAIL, STOP MAKING CALLS RIP OUT THE PHONE AND CLEAR OFF THE WALLS AND DON'T STOP TO WONDER WHY WE'RE GOIN' UNDER THAT'S JUST THE CASE AND YOU CAN'T ERASE IT NOW.

DOTTIE

TURN PAPERWORK IN RIGHT HERE I'LL GET A PILE STARTED PUT ALL YOUR FILES NEXT TO ME IF A NECKLACE SHOULD APPEAR PLEASE NOTIFY ME OF IT I LOST IT BACK IN '63

GERTIE

I SUPPOSE THAT IF YOU WANT TO KEEP YOUR STAPLERS THEN YOU MAY

EMPLOYEE OH THAT'S OK THEY NEVER WORKED RIGHT ANYWAY

DOTTIE AND GERTIE

AND PLACE YOUR NAMEPLATES ON THE COUNTERTOP AND TURN IN YOUR WASHROOM KEY DRIVE AND PROWESS SHOULD ALLOW US TO EXIT EXPEDITIOUSLY

GERTIE

YOU'VE ALL HEARD THE SAYING "TIME IS MONEY" WELL THE LESS WE STAY, THE LESS WE LOSE

SO BOX UP THE TAPE, TAPE UP THE BOX TAKE DOWN THE PLAQUES AND PACK UP THE CLOCKS STOP READING MAIL, STOP TAKING CALLS RIP OUT THE PHONE AND CLEAR OFF THE WALLS AND DON'T STOP TO WONDER WHY WE'RE GOIN' UNDER JUST SAY IT'S CHANCE, IT'S A HEALTHY STANCE TO CHOOSE

(Music break as EMPLOYEES clean out the office)

AND DON'T FRET IF YOU'VE GOT MOUTHS TO FEED OR A LOT OF BILLS TO PAY IF YOU'RE WORRIED ABOUT NEXT MONTH'S RENT THERE'S NO REASON TO DISMAY

ALL

SAY HELLO TO MR. UNEMPLOYMENT TAKE YOUR OUTSTRETCHED PALM AND SHAKE HIS HAND

GERTIE

THEN KICK UP YOUR FEET, BREAK OUT THE WINE ALL YOU GOTTA DO IS STAND IN LINE AND AIN'T IT A WONDER THAT WE'RE GOIN' UNDER SIX MONTHS OF FUN WITH A SUMMER ON THE SAND

PACK EVERYTHING UP, LET'S GO
YES, THAT'S THE TICKET PEOPLE
FEEL THE EXCITEMENT IN YOUR VEINS
TELL EV'RYONE THAT YOU KNOW
THIS WAS THE LAST HURRAH
OF PAUL BINNING'S HONEST INCLINED PLANES
YOU HAVE DONE ME PROUD YET ONCE AGAIN
AND IN WHATEVER FIELD YOU MAY PROGRESS
I'M SURE YOU'LL MEET WITH GREAT SUCCESS

AND IF YOU NEED A REFERENCE TALK TO ME FOR I PROMISE YOU I WOULD HIRE EACH AND EV'RY ONE OF YOU IN A SECOND IF I COULD DON'T CONFUSE MY HASTE FOR LACK OF CARING

CHORUS

WE ALL UNDERSTAND, WE'LL MISS YOU TOO

NOW STOP READING MAIL, STOP TAKING CALLS

GERTIE

RIP OUT THE PHONE
AND CLEAR OFF THE WALLS
BOX UP THE TAPE, TAPE UP THE BOX
TAKE DOWN THE PLAQUES AND
PACK UP THE CLOCKS
THEN KICK UP YOUR FEET,
BREAK OUT THE WINE
ALL YOU GOTTA DO IS STAND IN LINE

CLOSE NOW TO CLEAR, WE'RE IN THE FLOW

GO, GO, GO

CHORUS

STOP READING MAIL, STOP TAKING CALLS, RIP OUT THE PHONE AND CLEAR OFF THE WALLS, BOX UP THE TAPE, TAPE UP THE BOX TAKE DOWN THE PLAQUES AND PACK UP THE CLOCKS, THEN KICK UP YOUR FEET, BREAK OUT THE WINE, ALL YOU GOTTA DO IS STAND IN LINE

Act II Scene 2

Inclined Planes Incorporated

(RUDNICK sits in the board room with his EMPLOYEES and the wheel.)

RUDNICK

IT'S AMAZIN'
WHOA, IT'S AMAZIN'
AND WE STOLE IT
WHOA, WE CONTROL IT

EMPLOYEES

IT'S AMAZIN' THE WHEEL'S AMAZIN' AND IT'S BLAZIN' A NEW FRONTIER AND WE STOLE IT, NOW WE CONTROL IT SOMEONE ROLL IT TO OVER HERE

RUDNICK

MR. WHEEL MEET THE MAN WHO'S GONNA MAKE YOU A STAR IT'S THE START OF A WONDERFUL ROMANCE INCLINED PLANES AND THE WHEEL WILL REEL THE CUSTOMERS IN AND COMPETITION WON'T STAND A CHANCE

RUDNICK

IT'S REVOLVIN'
WHOA IT REVOLVIN'
IT WILL ENDOW US
WITH ALL THE PROWESS

EMPLOYEES

IT'S REVOLVIN', THE WHEEL'S REVOLVIN' AND IT'S SOLVIN' OUR BUSINESS WOES WILL ENDOW US WITH ALL THE PROWESS TO ALLOW US TO CRUSH OUR FOES.

RUDNICK

Gentlemen, congratulations are in order.

EMPLOYEES

Congratulations, Mr. Rudnick.

RUDNICK

Thank you, thank you. However, although this is a beautiful turn of events for us, all is not well. For some reason, the schematics for the wheel were not being transported with the wheel itself, and as such . . . we don't have them. However, a team of my top men are coming in tomorrow to start working non-stop until we get this thing reverse-engineered.

(MAN #1 enters)

MAN #1

Sir, your guests are here.

RUDNICK

Thank you, girl, you can send them in.

(MAN #1 exits)

Gentlemen, I'm about to introduce you to my top three security officers, brought in from across the land for the express purpose of protecting the wheel until our engineers can get at it.

(Two men, OG and UGH, enter, carrying large clubs.)

Ah, here they are now, uh, minus one, apparently. (Using intercom), Girl?

MAN #1

He just entered the building, sir.

RUDNICK

Send him in when he gets upstairs. (To employees) Gentlemen, I'd like you to meet Og and Ugh. (Introducing the two to each other). Ugh, Og. Og, Ugh.

UGH

(Shaking hands with OG and repeating his name.) Og.

OG

Ugh.

(A third guard, FRANCIS, runs in, also brandishing a club.)

FRANCIS

Sorry I'm late, sir, I had trouble finding the building.

RUDNICK

And this one, (shooting a glace at FRANCIS) from our head office—here—is Francis.

(The OG, UGH, AND FRANCIS (aka the GUARDS) shake hands and introduce each other.)

(To the guards) Gentlemen, I trust you know what you need to do.

OG AND UGH

Yes, sir.

FRANCIS

(A half-beat late) Yes, sir.

RUDNICK

(Hands them the wheel) Then here you are. I'll be checking in later.

(GUARDS exit)

(To employees) As for us, gentlemen, we are adjourned. Oh, and Porter, you're fired.

JOHNNY

Sir, how can you afford to keep. . .

RUDNICK

Shut up, Johnny.

Act II

Scene 3

Somewhere at Inclined Planes Inc.

(STEVE, PEGGY, and MARVIN sneak their way through the hallways of Inclined Planes Inc.)

PEGGY

Haven't we been this way already?

I'm not sure, all these hallways look the same. Wait! I think there's something over here.

(STEVE, PEGGY and MARVIN arrive at the spot where the wheel is being guarded. UGH, OG, and FRANCIS stand guard.)

Great. I was hoping he wouldn't have security out this fast.

PEGGY

What do we do?

STEVE

Well, we can't take them.

(MARVIN is eating a sandwich)

What are you eating?

MARVIN

A sandwich, I made some for everybody. Want one?

PEGGY

Hey, I made some, too. What kind are yours?

MARVIN

Egg salad.

PEGGY

I've got roast beef.

STEVE

Really? Sandwiches?

PEGGY

Sorry.

STEVE

Hey wait. Peggy, what's the best way to a man's heart?

PEGGY

Well, I always heard it was through his stomach, but Dottie says that's only the second best way.

(Thinking) Yeah . . . yeah, she's right. Never really thought about that phrase much. Well, I guess sandwiches will have to do. (To Marvin) Give me one of those.

(MARVIN gives the sandwich to STEVE, who proceeds to throw a few pieces of egg salad in the GUARDS' direction. FRANCIS starts to smell the food first.)

FRANCIS

Cue Track – Break Time

GETTING HUNGRY VERY HUNGRY (Pause) THERE'S NO WORD THAT RHYMES WITH HUNGRY

FRANCIS UGH OG

GETTING HUNGRY I'M GETTING HUNGRY

VERY HUNGRY

(OG, UGH, and FRANCIS start to sneak off, and as they do, STEVE, PEGGY, and MARVIN start to sneak towards the wheel. As STEVE, PEGGY, and MARVIN are almost there, the GUARDS run back towards the wheel, forcing STEVE, PEGGY, and MARVIN back into hiding.)

BUT I CAN'T DESERT THE POST I'VE BEEN ASSIGNED TO DEFEND 'CAUSE ALTHOUGH SLIM,

OG UGH FRANCIS SO I THINK I'LL SO I THINK TAKE A BREAK

YES, I THINK I'LL TAKE A BREAK FOR A SNACK

(The GUARDS start to leave again. After the GUARDS are gone and the music stops, STEVE, PEGGY, and MARVIN come out of hiding.)

PEGGY

We've got it.

STEVE

Yeah, we do. We actually do. Thanks.

MARVIN

What do we do now?

STEVE

We leave.

(RUDNICK enters with JOHNNY. RUDNICK carries a gun-looking slingshot.)

RUDNICK

Wrong, that's what you would do, if I weren't here to stop you. Now, if you'll kindly step to the side, I'll be taking the wheel and putting it someplace safe. Johnny?

JOHNNY

Yes, sir?

RUDNICK

I trust you know how to use one of these.

(RUDNICK hands JOHNNY the slingshot. The GUARDS return with food in their hands, but as they see what's occurring, they quickly turn around and walk offstage.)

JOHNNY

You bet, sir.

RUDNICK

Good. If any of these three move, use it. I'm going to find out what happened to my guards.

(A thunderclap is heard.)

Ooh, a thunderstorm. I do love a good thunderstorm. Johnny, join me in my office as soon as the guards return.

(RUDNICK leaves with the wheel.)

JOHNNY

Yes, sir. (To Steve, Peggy, and Marvin) Alright, who here would like a grand tour of the company dungeon? Anyone? (Raising slingshot) Anyone?

(STEVE, MARVIN, and PEGGY raise their hands.)

That's what I thought. Quite a fascinating history, actually, the company dungeon was built over four-hundred years ago during the neo-java war, as a deterrent . . .

Act II

Scene 4

Inclined Planes Inc. holding cell

(STEVE, PEGGY, and MARVIN are behind bars. A half-hour or so has passed, and the GUARDS and JOHNNY stand watch. The GUARDS have lots of food with them.)

JOHNNY

. . . where it is widely used today to interrogate and detain company traitors, underperforming employees, and members of the competition, the category under which you now find yourselves captive.

STEVE

Fascinating.

JOHNNY

Well, I'm off to see Mr. Rudnick. (To the guards) Don't let these guys get out.

OG AND UGH

Yes, sir.

FRANCIS

Yes, sir.

JOHNNY

Now, we've gotten you all the food you could possibly want. Has everybody gone to the bathroom?

(OG and UGH look at FRANCIS.)

FRANCIS

I'm not five.

JOHNNY

(To OG and UGH) Keep an eye on him, too, please. I'll be back in a little while.

(JOHNNY leaves.)

PEGGY

(To Steve) I'm sorry you lost your wheel. (Pause) Life will go on.

I don't doubt that it will. That's kind of the problem, isn't it? I just wanted to make an impression.

PEGGY

But people will still use your invention, and so what if they don't know that you invented it? We'll know.

MARVIN

It's what you do that makes you great, not whether people recognize it.

STEVE

Oh what, did you get that off of a calendar or something? Look at history, who do people remember? Peggy, who invented fire?

PEGGY

Uh. . . Joseph Grunter.

STEVE

Marvin, who invented sliced bread?

MARVIN

The Port Brothers, Lewis and Gilbert.

STEVE

The inclined plane?

MARVIN AND PEGGY

Dr. Ronald Amp

STEVE

These are the people that have made this world great, that have made a contribution to society. And they're remembered, they're revered. People celebrate holidays around them. Kids learn their names in school. Their legacies will live on in their inventions long after we're dead. Who wouldn't want to leave a piece of themselves behind like that, to be a part of the of this world after you're gone? (Pause) You're right, it shouldn't matter, but it does. To me it does. I shouldn't have dragged you guys into this. It was more about me and my failures than it was about the company. It's not fair to you. I'm really sorry.

PEGGY

You didn't drag us into this, Steve. We made the choice to come here. What you've done is amazing. You deserve the credit for it and Binning's should be the company that sells it. Rudnick certainly doesn't deserve to have it. What we're doing is right, even if you think your motivation's wrong.

STEVE

Well at any rate, I appreciate your coming; you were clearly in this for the right reasons.

PEGGY

Right. Or. . .not.

(STEVE gives PEGGY a puzzled look. PEGGY nods in MARVIN's direction as MARVIN forelornly gazes out of the cell.)

STEVE

Αh

PEGGY

Yeah.

(STEVE motions for PEGGY to talk to MARVIN. PEGGY starts singing with the intention of having MARVIN hear her.)

Cue Track – I Know a Guy

I KNOW A GUY
HE'S A LITTLE BIT DIFF'RENT.
BUT DIFF'RENT GOOD
AT LEAST, I THINK
AND I THINK I SHOULD
GO GRAB THAT DRINK
WITH A GUY WHO CAN CHEER ME
AND MAYBE HEAR ME
AND WHO MIGHT LIVE HIS DAYS TO GIVE
ME A WONDERFUL LIFE

STEVE

I KNOW A GUY

IT'S ALWAYS THE SAME, NOBODY NOTICES HOW I FEEL NOW STEVEN HAS GUARANTEED MY LONLINESS BECAUSE SHE'LL BE INTO THIS OTHER GUY AND WHO IS THIS GUY? WHY DID HE HAVE TO CHOOSE HER? MY ONE SHRED OF HOPE IS HE SOUNDS LIKE A LOSER.

PEGGY I LOVE YOU I LOVE YOU, AND CAN'T LIVE WITHOUT YOU. I DON'T KNOW WHO THIS OTHER GUY IS, BUT I PROMISE YOU IF YOU GIVE ME A CHANCE, I WILL MAKE YOU HAPPY.

IF IT WERE YOU AND I, A DAY WOULD NOT GO BY WHERE I'D NOT TELL YOU OF MY NEVER-ENDING LOVE YOU MEAN THE WORLD TO ME. I'D GIVE MY LIFE TO SEE YOUR EV'RY DREAM COME TRUE, 'CAUSE I'M IN LOVE WITH YOU.

I'VE TRIED TO BLOCK YOU OUT, A HOPELESS CAUSE, IT SEEMS. MY DAYS ARE FILLED WITH DOUBT, YOUR VISION HAUNTS MY DREAMS BUT, THEN, HOW WOULD YOU KNOW, UNLESS I TOLD YOU SO SOMEDAY I WILL

TODAY I WILL
RIGHT NOW TODAY
I'LL FIN'LLY TELL YOU HOW I FEEL

(MARVIN tries to muster up the courage to say something, but fails and immediately sits down.)

I KNOW A GUY HE'S A LITTLE BIT BASHFUL AND IN THIS CASE IT MIGHT BEHOOVE YOU TO BE FIRST TO MAKE A MOVE HE'S A LITTLE BIT TIMID

LISA

HE IS INSIGHTFUL **NEVER BEEN SPITEFUL COULD BE DELIGHTFUL**

WITH OUR FIRST NIGHT FULL OF

MARVIN

PEGGY I LOVE YOU, I LOVE YOU, I CAN'T LIVE WITHOUT YOU. I DON'T KNOW WHO THIS OTHER GUY IS, BUT I PROMISE YOU, IF YOU GIVE ME A CHANCE, I WILL MAKE YOU HAPPY.

STEVE

I KNOW A GUY HE'S A LITTLE THICK-HEADED I MEAN, COME ON, YOU'RE TELLING ME YOU THOUGHT THIS GUY... ALRIGHT, I SEE.

PEGGY

LET ME MAKE THIS SEEMS CLEARER, LOOK IN THE MIRROR. YOU'LL SEE THIS GUY THAT HE AND I HAVE BEEN TALKING ABOUT.

LISA STEVE

IT MAY BE STRANGE, AND A LITTLE BIT AWKWARD. BUT WE'LL LAY LOW, AND I'LL GO SLOW, AND GET TO KNOW MY NOUVEAUX BEAU. AND I KNOW THAT IT'S SURELY SOME SUBTLETY STILL VERY EARLY, AND EVEN YET,

THAT WAS AMUSING NOT SO CONFUSING DON'T GO ACCUSING **ME OF ABUSING** HIM BY MY USING

WAIT, YOU MEAN IT'S ME. I MEAN **OF COURSE IT'S** ME. YOU THINK I THOUGHT YOU WERE THINKING OF SOME OTHER GUY, THAT'S **CRAZY. I KNEW IT**

ALL ALONG.

MARVIN

STEVEN, LISA, AND MARVIN I'D HAVE TO BET ON THIS GOING QUITE WELL

AT LEAST SOMEDAY WHEN THEY LET US OUT OF THIS CELL.

MARVIN

(To guards) Hey, you aren't planning on killing us, are you?

OG

Kill? Oh no, that ain't like Mr. Rudnick at all.

UGH

Yeah, he's more of the let-you-wallow-in-your-own-disappointment-until-it-eats-you-up-inside kind of guy.

MARVIN

That's a relief.

OG

No, my guess is he'll hold you here until they get that new thing figured out, then he'll let you go.

MARVIN

Why not just let us go now?

OG

Yeah, good one.

PEGGY

(Looking at Francis) Hey.

FRANCIS

Huh?

PEGGY

Yeah you, come here for a second.

(FRANCIS walks over.)

(Looking at him) Hey, you're not by any chance (whispering) a Neanderthal (normal voice), are you?

FRANCIS

Only on my mother's side.

PEGGY

So they do exist.

FRANCIS

(Looks at himself) I guess.

PEGGY

I know someone who I think would really like you.

FRANCIS

Really?

Yeah.	PEGGY
What's she like?	FRANCIS
What, you're picky?	PEGGY
Hey, I don't need you	FRANCIS or charity, I do OK.
She'swell	PEGGY
Is she nice?	FRANCIS
(Pause) In her way.	PEGGY
Funny?	FRANCIS
Definitely funny.	PEGGY
You got some sort of or anything, it's just,	FRANCIS picture? I'm not prejudgemental you know.
you a composite b	PEGGY picture on me. I canugh draw passed on what we say she looks like. The pays, help me draw a picture of what's your name?
Francis.	FRANCIS
Huh? How's this going	STEVE ng to help?
Oh, I'm sorry, are you	PEGGY a busy with something else?

Point taken.

PEGGY

(To Francis) You got any paper? Pencil?

FRANCIS

Uh. . . (looking around) I've got a stick.

PEGGY

Stick'll work.

(PEGGY starts drawing a picture on the ground with the stick, and is frequently corrected by STEVE and MARVIN, until they come up with a picture which they think is OK.)

(To Francis) Here.

FRANCIS

Looks like an eight-year-old drew it.

PEGGY

We're not really artists by trade.

FRANCIS

I don't know. I'm not really in the market right now. I'm trying to focus on my career.

PEGGY

(Thinks for a bit) Hey this girl—Dottie—and I. . .we're really good friends. I know way, way too much about her, and I can almost guarantee you that if you let us out of here, and I tell her all about how you saved us, she's going to (Whispers in Francis's ear.) And she'll actually like it.

FRANCIS

That's tabloid stuff.

PEGGY

Cross my heart. I've heard about it more times than I care to remember.

FRANCIS

Hmph. This job does seem to be limited in its prospects for upward mobility. You promise me you're telling the truth about your friend.

PEGGY

I didn't even know about half of that stuff until I met her.

FRANCIS

You've got a deal.

(FRANCIS opens the door.)

OG

Hey, what are you doing?

FRANCIS

I'm tendering my resignation.

(A battle breaks out between FRANCIS and the other two GUARDS. FRANCIS finishes them both off easily.)

STEVE

Best way to a man.

MARVIN

That Dottie's a smart woman.

PEGGY

Thank you, Francis. She's going to hear all about this.

(MARVIN picks up one of the fallen guard's clubs and turns around, accidentally clubbing PEGGY on the head, knocking her to the ground.)

MARVIN

Peggy! Are you OK? I'm so sorry.

(PEGGY sits up and looks at MARVIN.)

PEGGY

I'm fine, Marvin. Never better.

(The two gaze at each other.)

STEVE

Hey, guys, what's going on here? (Pause) Guys? (Pause) Alright, break it up. We've still got work to do.

MARVIN

Uh, how about if you go on ahead? Francis, you stand guard here, and, uh, Peg and I will go to the left.

Well, thanks for the help, guys. I'm off to go get killed now, have fun without me.

(STEVE starts to exit.)

FRANCIS

If you see Mr. Rudnick, tell him I'm giving my two-weeks' notice.

STEVE

Sure thing, Francis.

(STEVE exits.)

Act II Scene 5

Rudnick's office

(RUDNICK stands at a large window, watching the storm and laughing quietly to himself. The wheel sits on a podium in the office. JOHNNY enters.)

JOHNNY

Mr. Rudnick?

RUDNICK

Johnny, come here. I want you to take a look at this. A thunderstorm and a big window, last bastion of sanity for the evil. Take a look, Johnny. See all of those people out there? Those are people you control, and they're all getting stormed on. Kind of a metaphor for life. Beautiful. Everything OK in the dungeon?

JOHNNY

Yes, sir. They're locked up tight.

RUDNICK

Good work, Johnny. Now why don't you run back there and keep an eye on things for me.

JOHNNY

Yes, sir.

(JOHNNY exits. RUDNICK picks up a picture frame from his desk.)

RUDNICK

"Yes, sir". I remember when I used to say that to you, Jim. He's a lot like I was, isn't he? And I suppose now I'm a lot like you were, not quite as evil, I'd never claim that. You were the man, Jim. (Sighs) Oh, but you'd love what I have going here. We're going to do it, Jim. Corner the market, and then, who knows? Just like you wanted. Inclined Planes Incorporated. What's with that name? Couldn't think of something snazzier? Oh, well, doesn't matter now. We're almost there, Jim. Yes, sir.

Cue Track – Mr. Mancratzenfield A LONG TIME AGO, WHEN I FIRST STARTED HERE AS AN INTERN STILL VIBRANT AND YOUNG THE NAME JIM MANCRATZENFIELD GARNERED SUCH FEAR THAT IT RARELY CROSSED ANYONE'S TONGUE

BUT THEY HAD NO IDEA OF THE POWER HE POSSESSED, THOUGH THEY KNEW HE WAS SPITEFUL AND MEAN NOBODY BUT I TOOK SUCH KEEN INTEREST IN THE EVILEST MIND THAT THE WORLD'S EVER SEEN

HOW SOON THE DETAILS OF ONE'S MEMORIES FADE WHEN A MAN'S NOT A MAN BUT A GHOST BUT I'LL NEVER FORGET HE WHO TAUGHT ME THIS TRADE, AND SO HERE'S TO THE MAN WHOM I STILL RESPECT MOST

MR. MANCRATZENFIELD
HOW COULD I EVER TRY TO DECRY YOUR WORLDLY VIEW
I CLAIM TO BE EVIL, BUT YOU WERE THE KING
THE BEST MASTERMINDIN' IS WHAT ONE COULD FIND IN
MR. MANCRATZENFIELD
NOT A SOUL IN THE WHOLE WORLD COULD OUTDO YOU
FOR NONE WERE ARTISTIC AT BEING SADISTIC
EXCEPT FOR THAT MYSTIC MR. MANCRATZENFIELD

WHEN I WAS YOUNG AND A TROUBLESOME, MEAN, BUT IMPRESSIONABLE LAD THERE WERE NO ROLE MODELS FOR A KID WHO LIKED TO BE BAD

BUT THEN I HEARD OF A MAN WHOM THEY SAID WAS SO RUTHLESS AND COLD
HIS DEVLISH SCHEMES WERE SO LARGE
HE COULD CHARGE YOU TO WATCH THEM UNFOLD, THAT VERY DAY I VOWED THAT I WOULD ONE DAY WORK FOR THE MAN WHOSE PLANS PUT OTHER MEN TO SHAME
WHILE I BIDED MY TIME, I WAS LEARNING THE RULES
OF THE CORPORATE GAME
AND WHEN THE TIME CAME, I
GRABBED SOME MONEY, PACKED UP MY THINGS
AND SLOWLY SHUFFLED OUT THE DOOR
STILL UNSURE IF THE STORIES I'D HEARD OF YOUR
GLORIOUS WARRING WERE JUST URBAN LORE

RUDNICK (CONT.)

BUT WHEN I WALKED INTO THIS PLACE A SMILE FLASHED 'CROSS MY FACE, BECAUSE

MR. MANCRATZENFIELD
WORKED THE ROOM WITH SUCH FLARE
I COULD BARELY STARE IN AWE
A MAN WHO LACKED VIRTUES, A MASTER OF LIES
NO FRAUD, THIEF, OR VANDAL
COULD E'ER HOLD A CANDLE TO
MR. MANCRATZENFIELD
EVERY SCHEME THAT HE'D DREAM WORKED WITHOUT A FLAW
AND THOUGH I'M NOW THRIVING,
I'LL NEVER STOP STRIVING
TO MATCH THAT CONNIVING MR. MANCRATZENFIELD

(RUDNICK dances with the picture frame, and hums along.)

NO MAN WAS MORE VICIOUS, NO MIND MORE MALICIOUS MR. MANCRATZENFIELD

(Spoken) Ah, Jim. I remember the time you advised two of your associate corporations to attempt hostile takeovers of each other. We laughed and laughed. It was genius, Jim, pure, evil genius.

AT TIMES LIKE THESE WHEN MY MIND STARTS TO WANDER I PONDER JUST HOW GOOD WE COULD HAVE BEEN I REMEMBER THE DAYS WE WOULD RANDOMLY RUIN A BUSINESS AND THEN, WE'D DO IT AGAIN, AND OUR EMPLOYEES BOWED AT OUR FEET WHENEVER WE WERE PASSING BY AND IT'S REALLY A SHAME AND TOO BAD THAT YOU HAD TO GO DO SOMETHING STUPID, AND DIE

SHOT, STABBED, AND STRANGLED FROM BEHIND NOW WHO COULD BE SO UNKIND

(RUDNICK whistles sheepishly, then starts to laugh.)

MR. MANCRATZENFIELD
YOU KNOW, YOU KNOW THERE'S NO ONE
I'M MORE INDEBTED TO
MY CHILDHOOD HERO, MY MENTOR, AND FRIEND
NO PLAN I COULD MUSTER COULD HOLD HALF THE LUSTER
OF ONE FROM YOU, MR. MANCRATZENFIELD
BUT HEY JIM, JIMMY THIS ONE'S FOR YOU
AND I KNOW YOU'RE LOVIN' IT UP THERE
'CAUSE NO ONE ADMIRED A PLAN SO INSPIRED
MORE THAN THAT JADED, HATED, UNDERRATED
INGENIOUS, MISCHIEV-I-OUS
AH, YOU WERE BRILLIANT
AND NOBODY UNDER MY DOMINION

RUDNICK (CONT.)

COULD EVER LOWER MY OPINION OF THAT BAD, MAD MR. MANCRATZENFIELD

(RUDNICK places the picture back on his desk, sits in his chair, and turns the chair around so that he can continue watching the storm. Shortly after, STEVE sneaks into the room. Thinking no one is around, he tries to grab the wheel.)

I don't think so.

(RUDNICK turns around.)

Nice try, though. (Pause) Speechless? (Pause) I can tell by your lack of speech that you're speechless. Look, I was content to let you wallow in your own disappointment until it ate you up inside. Hell, I'd have preferred it. That's just the kind of guy I am. But now I'm going to have to get somebody to come up here to kill you, and frankly, the paperwork on that is just atrocious.

STEVE

Yeah, I should have known I wouldn't be able to outsmart a guy like you. I mean, you're legendary.

RUDNICK

Oh, please, Steve. Try to trick the evil guy by complimenting him? That's the oldest trick in the large series of stone tablets describing tricks. I'm surprised you'd think I'd fall for that. Frankly, I'm a little hurt.

STEVE

You're right. I should have known better. So you're really going to kill me?

RUDNICK

Only second-hand. Cleaner that way.

STEVE

What if I offered to work for you?

RUDNICK

Interesting.

STEVE

We'd make a great team. You wouldn't have to hire those engineers. You'd save a fortune. Plus, who knows the wheel

STEVE (CONT.)

better than I do. We'll be years ahead of any competition. Binning's is done for, anyway. Come on, you and me.

RUDNICK

I think you're on to something, Barrows.

STEVE

Really?

RUDNICK

Yeah. I can see it now. No competition. Total domination of global markets. A vice-like grip on the production of simple machines everywhere. (Getting sickeningly sweet) Two wheels in every garage and a swimming pool in every back yard, please Barrows, I know the "team up with the evil guy and then turn against him trick", too. I tire of these games, I'm just gonna shoot you myself.

(RUDNICK pulls a slingshot out of his desk.)

I've been delegating too much lately, anyway. Makes you soft.

STEVE

Well how would I go about tricking you?

RUDNICK

I don't know; it's probably pretty tough.

STEVE

It would probably take a pretty masterful plan.

RUDNICK

I suppose it would.

STEVE

Not that you'd know anything about that.

RUDNICK

Look, I don't need to put up with your petty insults. How many evil empires do you have? How many? None? Then I'll decline giving merit to your opinions on the matter.

Your plans are horrible.

RUDNICK

I beg your pardon.

STEVE

You heard me. This plan to steal the wheel from us was at the very least uninspired, and at the worst a first-class display of no-talent hackery.

RUDNICK

Hey, that hurts. (To himself) I'll have to give Johnny a raise. (To Steve) And what exactly do you find so uninspiring about my plan?

STEVE

WELL IT'S NOT SO MUCH AN EVIL PLAN
YOU JUST SNEAKED AROUND, STOLE THE WHEEL, AND RAN
THAT NOT EVIL, THAT'S JUST THIEVERY, THROUGH AND THROUGH
I WOULD HAVE NEVER THOUGHT THAT YOU'D HAVE
STOOPED TO THAT
MR. IRON FIST, MR. AUTOCRAT
I GUESS THAT I JUST WOULD'VE EXPECTED MORE FROM YOU

RUDNICK

WELL TELL ME STEVEN, WHAT WOULD YOU HAVE DONE IF YOU WERE ME, THEN WHAT WOULD YOU HAVE DONE

STEVEN

I'D CHANGE MY WAYS AND GIVE OL' STEVE MY GUN

RUDNICK

PLEASE HUMOR ME, NOW WHAT WOULD YOU HAVE DONE

STEVEN

I DON'T KNOW, I'D PLAY IT UP SOME MORE
I THINK YOUR PLAN'S TOO SIMPLE AT IT'S CORE
IT NEEDS SOME SPUNK, SOME ENERGY, YOU KNOW,
A LITTLE MORE PIZZAZZ
YOUR PLAN HAD SO LITTLE RISK

RUDNICK

THAT'S RIGHT, AND IF THERE ISN'T RISK YOU NEVER LOSE THE FIGHT AND A MINIMAL RISK IS WHAT A PLAN THAT'S PERFECT HAS

NOW STEVEN, YES, MY PLAN WAS A SIMPLE ONE BUT WHEN EVERYTHING WAS FINALLY SAID AND DONE IT WORKED, AND THAT'S THE MOST IMPORTANT THING YOU DON'T NEED TO PUT ON A GREAT BIG SHOW RUDNICK (CONT.)

TO BE EVIL, THE IMPORTANT THING IS TO KNOW AND TO WEIGH OUT THE POWER THAT CERTAIN ACTIONS BRING

FOR ME TO HAVE THAT POWER DOWN THE LINE I HAD TO MAKE QUITE SURE THE WHEEL WAS MINE SO WHY TAKE RISKS ON PLANS THAT WILL IMPRESS MORE TIMES THAN NOT, THEY CAUSE AN AWFUL MESS

RUDNICK AND STEVE

BECAUSE YOU SEE, WHEN ALL IS SAID AND DONE THE PERFECT PLAN CAN BE A SIMPLE ONE

STEVE

YEAH, I THINK I SEE YOUR POINT

RUDNICK

ALRIGHT

STEVE

BUT A MAN OF YOUR MALEVOLENCIOUS MIGHT COULD HAVE THOUGHT OF SOMETHING MEANER, MUCH MORE VILE I THINK IT WAS TOO NICE

RUDNICK

YOU DO

STEVE

YEAH

RUDNICK

HUH, 'CAUSE YOU KNOW, I KIND OF THOUGHT THAT TOO BUT I DIDN'T HAVE THE TIME TO GO THAT EXTRA MILE

SEE, IN A PERFECT PLAN, I GET THE WHEEL WITHOUT TAKING RISKS, BUT TO MAKE YOU FEEL MUCH WORSE IT'S YOUR OWN FAULT THAT I SUCCEED BUT A PLAN LIKE THAT TAKES TIME, YOU SEE TIME I DIDN'T HAVE, TO WEAVE A TAPESTRY OF INTRIGUE, LYING, JEALOUSLY, AND GREED

BUT WITH SOME TIME, I COULD HAVE MADE A PLAN SO CRUEL IT WOULD HAVE BROKEN ANY MAN

STEVE

BUT CAN YOU TELL ME JUST WHAT I MIGHT HAVE FACED HAD YOU NOT BEEN IN SUCH A STATE OF HASTE

RUDNICK

(Spoken) Oh, I don't know. It takes time. You have to find out what everybody wants, what their weaknesses are. Then you can start manipulating them. And the beautiful thing is that they never see it coming. People let egos blind them,

RUDNICK (CONT.)

they let hate blind them, they let love blind them, and you have to play off of that. Then you can lead those blind fools wherever it is you want them to go. And when everything falls apart for them, the only people they have to blame are themselves.

A PLAN IS BETTER WHENEVER IT'S THE CASE
IT'S THEIR OWN FAULT THAT THEY DESCEND FROM GRACE
SO TIE THAT IN WITH LITTLE RISK INVOLVED
AND THEN THAT'S IT, THE PROBLEM HAS BEEN SOLVED
IF YOU'D BEEN BROKEN BY JEALOUSY AND GREED
WELL THAT WOULD BE A PERFECT PLAN INDEED

RUDNICK
IF YOU'D BEEN BROKEN
BY JEALOUSY AND GREED
WELL THAT WOULD BE A
PERFECT PLAN INDEED

STEVE
IF I'D BEEN BROKEN
BY JEALOUSY AND GREED
WELL THAT WOULD BE A
PERFECT PLAN INDEED

STEVE

BUT HOW

RUDNICK

YES HOW, THAT'S THE QUESTION ISN'T IT WANT TO GIVE IT A SHOT

STEVE

YEAH

GIVE ME A MINUTE, OK HERE GOES

YOU SEND A GUY OVER TO COME AND TALK TO ME WHO SAYS HE'LL BUY THE WHEEL FOR A ONE-TIME FEE AND HE'S HOT A LUCRATIVE CONTRACT IN HIS HAND AND I'M SO QUICK TO SIGN, I DON'T BOTHER TO READ THAT FINE PRINT ABOVE THE DOTTED LINE WHICH GIVES THE WHEEL TO YOU AND YOU STEAL THE WHEEL

RUDNICK

Oh, come on, now. Do you think so little of yourself that you believe you'd fall for that?

STEVE

Well, no.

RUDNICK

Well, then, great plan, you evil mastermind. Can I be your plus-one when you're nominated for the annual scheming awards next fall?

Hey, it was my first try. Give me another shot.

RUDNICK

The floor is yours.

STEVE

PRETEND THAT I AM YOU, FOR EASE'S SAKE
AND THAT YOU ARE ME, AND I'M ABOUT TO TAKE
THE WHEEL, AND YOU, THAT'S ME, SAYS "MERCY NO"
AND THEN YOU, WHO'S ME TRIES TO CLUB YOUR HEAD
BUT THEN ME, WHO'S NOW YOU, GOES AND SHOOTS ME DEAD
I GUESS IT'S TRUE THAT IT'S ALWAYS
THE BEST WHO ARE FIRST TO GO

BUT YOU CAN'T LEAVE THE BODY ON THE GROUND INSIDE UNLESS YOU MAKE IT LOOK JUST LIKE A SUICIDE AND YOU GIVE THE GUN TO ME, WHO IS YOU FOR NOW

(STEVE takes the slingshot from a confused Rudnick.)

HEY CONGRATS, YOU'RE GONNA GET OFF SCOTT FREE WITHOUT EVER HAVIN' TO WORRY 'BOUT YOU, WHO'S ME AND THEN ME, WHO IS YOU, RUNS AWAY AND STEALS THE WHEEL

RUDNICK

Well, that's a little better, but you're . . . I'm dead, and I can't really feel guilty about a fall from grace if I'm dead.

STEVE

Well then how about this one . . .

PRETEND A MAN WITH NO SOUL STOLE THE WHEEL FROM YOU AND IN A FIT RAGE, YOU'VE DECIDED TO CONFRONT THIS MAN AND GET WHAT'S TRULY YOURS AS YOU'RE ABOUT TO DO WHAT YOU'VE SET OUT TO DO YOU FIND THE MAN IN A CHAIR SITTING NEXT TO YOU AND HE PULLS A GUN FROM ONE OF HIS DESK DRAWERS

RUDNICK

Ooh, I like where this is going. I feel a turnaround coming on.

STEVE

THAT'S RIGHT, IT'S COMING, 'CAUSE YOU START TO CHATTER 'BOUT THIS AND THAT, IT DOESN'T REALLY MATTER YOU JUST KEEP ON TALKING, AND WAITING FOR YOUR CHANCE THEN THROUGH CLEVER WORDING AND SOME TRICKERY HE HANDS HIS GUN TO YOU VOLUNTARILY

(STEVE points the gun at RUDNICK.)

STEVE (CONT.)

THEN YOU SIT HIM IN A CHAIR, TIE HIM UP, AND STEAL THE WHEEL STEAL THE WHEEL THEN YOU SIT HIM IN A CHAIR, TIE HIM UP, AND STEAL THE WHEEL

RUDNICK

(Applauding) Yes, yes! Brilliant! See, now you've got it! You turned him on himself. It's his own fault he's going to fail . . . except . . .

STEVE

Except?

RUDNICK

YOU STEAL THE WHEEL FROM A WORKING MAN KNOWING IN YOUR HEART THAT THE MAN WILL PLAN TO STEAL THAT PRECIOUS WHEEL BACK FROM YOU SOMEHOW SO YOU STAY FAR AHEAD OF THE POOR BUFFOON 'TILL HE WALKS IN YOUR OFFICE LIKE A TRAINED BABOON AND SPOUTS WORDS AS FAST AS HIS POOR TONGUE WILL ALLOW

(RUDNICK gets up and starts walking to his desk.)

SO YOU SAY OK, AND LET HIM HAVE YOUR GUN WHICH IS FINE, 'CAUSE YOU DIDN'T EVER LOAD THAT ONE AND JUST WHEN HE THINKS VICTORY'S IN HIS HANDS YOU TELL HIM THAT HIS MOMENT IN THE SUN IS DONE

(RUDNICK grabs a slingshot from his desk and points it at STEVE as he walks toward him)

AND THEN YOU GO TO YOUR DESK AND GRAB A LOADED GUN AND YOU TELL THE LITTLE MAN THAT HE WON'T STEAL THE WHEEL STEAL THE WHEEL THEN YOU TELL THE LITTLE MAN THAT HE WON'T STEAL THE WHEEL

A PERFECT PLAN AFTER ALL, YOU SEE, FALSE VIC'TRY O'ER YOUR ARCHENEMY AND NOW MY PLANNED DOMINATION CAN BEGIN I WIN! I WIN!

STEVE

(Thinks for a while)
(To himself)
WELL LOOKING BACK, THERE'S SOMETHING THAT HE SAID

(To Rudnick) That thing you said before, about "two wheels in every garage", I know you were mocking me and all, but that's actually how it'd be, wouldn't it? You'd really push these things hard, wouldn't you?

RUDNICK

Of course I would. It's a brilliant invention, Barrows, I'm gonna make a fortune off of it. It's a little hard to do that if I don't push it.

STEVE

(To himself)

NO CREDIT, BUT ENSURED SUCCESS INSTEAD

(To Rudnick) Mass production in a couple of weeks, selling globally within the next few months.

RUDNICK

I'm well aware of how it works, Steven. What are you getting at?

STEVE

(To himself)

THE FAME IS NICE, DESIRING IT'S INNATE.
THE NERD WAS RIGHT, IT'S NOT WHAT MAKES YOU GREAT

(To Rudnick) You can keep it.

RUDNICK

Come again?

STEVE

The wheel, you can keep it. I'm going to head home and wallow in my own disappointment now.

RUDNICK

I'm not following. You're just going to leave it behind?

STEVE

You're not leaving me much choice. Besides, it's in good hands.

(STEVE walks out.)

RUDNICK

(Calling after him) Is this some kind of trick, Barrows? The pretend-you're-giving-the-evil-guy-what-he-wants-but-then-you-actually-don't trick? If that's the trick, you're screwing it up? What's your game? You can't just leave like this! Barrows! Get back here! (To himself) I'm so confused.

(FRANCIS enters.)

RUDNICK (CONT.)

Ah, Francis. Excellent job guarding Mr. Barrows, I see. Do you care to tell me why he was just in my office?

FRANCIS

Mr. Rudnick, I'm here to inform you of my decision to tender my resignation.

RUDNICK

(Sarcastically) Oh, well I can't tell you what a great loss that will be to this company.

FRANCIS

I may be strong in stature, Mr. Rudnick, but I'm weak in will, and although I once had a dream of working for your fine establishment for the rest of my career, I'm afraid a new opportunity has arisen, and the benefits of this offer far outweigh any monetary rewards I may receive here.

RUDNICK

(To himself) Maybe it was some variation on the "make-the-evil-guy-think-he's-won-so-he-drops-his-guard" plan.

FRANCIS

I'm not above temptation, sir. At first I planned to offer my services for another two weeks, in fairness to you and this fine corporation you run. However, upon further discussions with some new acquaintances, I have determined that there is a better course of action ahead, one which will put both myself and others in a much better position in t his crazy thing we call life. Therefore it is with a heavy heart that I must resort to the following. . .

(FRANCIS grabs RUDNICK by the throat.)

I mean no disrespect, sir, but I'm going to be taking this item (points to the wheel) from your office, because applicable laws regarding property rights clearly indicate that the item in question does not belong to you. I need to knock you out now. I apologize, and can only hope that one day you will grace me with your forgiveness.

(FRANCIS knocks out RUDNICK. PEGGY and MARVIN enter, dragging JOHNNY behind them.)

PEGGY

You did it! Thank you!

FRANCIS

(Motioning to Johnny) Is he going to be OK?

MARVIN

He should be fine. I think you hit him just hard enough to put him out.

(STEVE runs in.)

STEVE

What are you guys. . . (notices the bodies on the floor) What happened? I heard yelling.

PEGGY

Francis happened.

STEVE

(Surveys the situation for a while) So it's ours?

PEGGY

It's certainly not theirs.

STEVE

Huh. (stands there looking around).

PEGGY

Is everything all right?

STEVE

Yeah. Yeah, everything's good. Thanks, guys. Let's get back to Binning's.

(FRANCIS, PEGGY, and MARVIN exit, a thunderclap sounds, and STEVE wanders over to the picture window and looks outside. He then looks sheepishly around the room, looks out the window, gives a maniacal laugh, then turns and runs out the door.)

Act II

Scene 6

Binning's Inclined Planes

(STEVE, PEGGY, MARVIN, and FRANCIS return to an empty office. STEVE carries the wheel.)

PEGGY

Where is everybody?

(GERTIE enters, wearing something casual and whistling.)

STEVE

Gertie!

GERTIE

Huh? Oh, you guys scared me. Hey, you got it back? I'll be damned. I'm more surprised than a hobo's sweetheart on Flemming Day in Rygard.

STEVE

Uh, yeah. We're fine. Where is everybody?

GERTIE

Well, in all honesty, Steve, we didn't think you'd be able to do it, and so we moved out.

STEVE

Well move back in. We've got the wheel.

GERTIE

Aw, hon, I'm through doing this. I've made enough money in my life to be happy. I'm looking forward to retirement. Thanks for the offer, though.

STEVE

But what about the wheel?

GERTIE

Well that's easy.

(GERTIE hands a set of keys to STEVE.)

I'm keeping the building. Going rate on leases in this area is thirty stones a square-foot, payment first of month, every month. Two-percent per day late fee on previous month's

GERTIE (CONT.)

rent, and fifty-percent of any special assessment or necessary improvements to the building and/or surrounding property. . . but I can probably cut you a deal.

STEVE

Thanks. For everything.

GERTIE

You can thank me by save me one of those things when you start production. I don't like waiting in line.

STEVE

You got it.

GERTIE

You know, you always were one of Paul's favorites.

STEVE

I know.

GERTIE

And mine.

STEVE

Thanks.

GERTIE

Well, what are you standing around for? Look at all these slackers. (To everyone) Look at all you slackers! New equation! Your boss equals Steven Barrows! Memorize it! You answer to him! (To Steve) They're all yours. Don't let 'em push you around. Good luck.

(As the music starts, EMPLOYEES start filing in and restoring the office.)

STEVE

BRING EVERYTHING IN LET'S GO START TO UNPACK THOSE BOXES PUT ALL THE CLOCKS BACK ON THE WALL WE NEED TO PREPARE AND SO PLUG ALL THE PHONES BACK IN, IN CASE ANYONE SHOULD TRY TO CALL

I CAN SEE BY YOUR EXCITED FACES IT WON'T BE TOO LONG BEFORE THIS STORE

STEVE (CONT.)

IS SURE TO SOAR FOREVER MORE
SO PUT THOSE PLANTS UP ON THE WINDOWSILLS
STACK THOSE BOOKS UPON THE SHELVES
BUT DON'T DWELL ON THE OPPORTUNITY
WE HAVE GIVEN TO OURSELVES
IT'S A DAUNTING TASK, BUT WE'LL BE READY
FOR A STEADY FLOW OF FOLKS TO SERVE
NOTHING TO STEAL, NO ONE TO FIGHT
ANYONE CAN SEE THAT OUR FUTURE'S BRIGHT
OUR PRE-SALES ARE SCORCHIN', AND WE'LL MAKE A FORTUNE
AND FIN'LY GET THE ATTENTION WE DESERVE

AND THEN THEY'LL NOTICE ME
NOW I'LL FIN'LY BE THE ONE
WHOSE NAME IS SAID AND ALWAYS RECOGNIZED
NO MORE OBSCURITY
NO MORE HAUNTING FAILURES NOW
FOR NOW MY DREAMS HAVE ALL AT ONCE BEEN REALIZED
AND I KNOW HOW TRUE HAPPINESS FEELS
IN DESIGNING AND REFINING ALL MY WHEELS

(PEGGY and MARVIN enter.)

MARVIN

WON'T SOMEBODY TELL ME WHERE MY OFFICE IS

(STEVE walks over to MARVIN as PEGGY walks over to DOTTIE.)

STEVE

Marvin! How's my new head engineer?

MARVIN

I'm doing great. We enjoyed the vacation.

STEVE

I'm glad. I cleaned out my office. It's all ready for you to move in.

MARVIN

Thanks, Steve. I want to go over some of those new plans with you later.

DOTTIE

(To Peggy) How was the trip?

PEGGY

You know, for such a scrawny guy, he wields a hell of a club.

DOTTIE

Well, I'm glad you're happy.

PEGGY

I am. And I've got something for you, too.

(PEGGY exits, then comes onstage with FRANCIS).

Dottie, meet Francis. Francis, Dottie. He's half Neanderthal!

FRANCIS

On my mother's side.

DOTTIE

Which makes you a Neanderthal, technically.

FRANCIS

Technically.

DOTTIE

(To Peggy) I owe you.

PEGGY

You can pay me back by never again mentioning what you're about to do.

(DOTTIE jumps into FRANCIS'S arms.)

DOTTIE

HEY I GOT A NEANDERTHAL

STEVE

SOMEONE TAKE DOWN THE ORDERS
AS THEY COME THROUGH THE DOOR
SOMEONE MAKE SURE PRODUCTION IS ON-LINE
SOMEONE TAKE OUT THE TRASH
SOMEBODY SWEEP UP THE FLOOR
SEND OUT NEXT WEEK'S MAIL, AND UNVEIL THE SIGN

(Someone unveils a sign which reads "Steven Barrows's Deals on Wheels".)

GERTIE

IT'S AMAZIN'
WHOA, IT'S AMAZIN'
HALLELUIAH
WHOA, HALLELUIAH

CHORUS

IT'S AMAZIN', THE WHEEL'S AMAZIN' AND IT'S BLAZIN' A NEW FRONTIER HALLELUIAH, IT'S COMIN' TO 'YA HOLD YOUR BREATH 'CAUSE IT'S HERE

GERTIE

TAKE TIME TO PAUSE, BECAUSE WHERE I STAND I HERE THE BUZZ ALL ACROSS THE LAND

GERTIE AND STEVE

WE'RE ON THE VERGE OF THE CHANGING TIMES BRAND NEW FRONTIERS, A NEW SET OF PARADIGMS

ALL

BRING IN THE NEW, THROW OUT THE OLD
THOUGH WE DON'T KNOW WHAT THE FUTURE HAS TO HOLD
WE KNOW FOR SURE THAT WE'LL BE SECURE
IN TIMES OF NEED, WE WILL SUCCEED
WE WILL SUCCEED
WHAT LIES BEYOND IS A MYSTERY
THE OLDEST QUESTION IN HISTORY
A BRAND NEW AGE OF CREATION'S ON ITS WAY
TO STAY
TODAY

(Blackout) (Bows)

(After the bows, we see RUDNICK sitting on a street somewhere with a box beside him, disheveled. A similarly disheveled JOHNNY comes running over to him, carrying something.)

JOHNNY

Sir! Sir!

RUDNICK

Johnny, get that thing out of here! I never want to see another one of those blasted things for as long as I live.

JOHNNY

No, you have to see this, sir. Look, I took this wheel and put a string over the top of it. If I tie something to one end and pull the other, look!

(He does this.)

I call it . . . the pulley.

(Blackout.)
