
Actors and singers – dancers too – often speak of their professional activities as a "calling" because of how powerful and attractive is the almost invisible beckoning that calls us home to the stage.

By the way, you should probably work on a legible autograph.






In 1955 New York, on the verge of death yet armed with unyielding creative passion, Max confronts his final moment by summoning spectral memories and mystical guide—transforming his park bench into a vivid stage where music, film and a personal language become the tapestry of his life's unfinished masterpiece.

This month, we're bringing you songs from Jim and Ruth Bauer's THE BLUE FLOWER. There's a lot that could be said about it, especially since it's very different from most of our shows. The music is unusual, and the plot is not continuous. Hal introduces it as a DADA project referring to a movement in the art world that emerged from World War 1 as an anti-establishment form that utilized irrationality, satire, and nonsense. Though it originally took me by surprise, I grew to cherish the piece and now include it as one of my favorites.

Theater Resources Unlimited

In addition to being a MainStreet Musicals writer (libretto, music and lyrics) and a playwright who sometimes directs and produces, Bob Os is the founder of Theater Resources Unlimited, a 33 year old non-profit arts service organization. Known as TRU, his company offers everyone

a supportive community that interfaces producers and artists at all levels of experience. With a focus on the business side of the arts, TRU provides educational programs that help theater professionals navigate those tricky waters and find success.

TRU also develops new works and fosters writer-producer relationships through the TRU Voices New Plays and New Musicals Reading Series.

Shutdown forced TRU, like everyone else, into the virtual world and inspired a new program, TRUSpeak: Hear Our Voices!, evenings of short plays written for stage but filmed and livestreamed. It also moved

TRU from a small New York based company to a global resource for theater makers everywhere – shutdown forced Bob to rethink everything in virtual terms, starting with a weekly Community Gathering zoomcast Bob has run every Friday since April 17th, 2020. These are conversations with theater professionals about all aspects of theater and the arts in general. Five years and 264 consecutive weeks later, TRU welcomes you to join their community, attend their weekly


